# BRAVE STORY OF ESCAPE

A BRAVE woman who was beaten and strangled by her ex-partner exposed his evil actions by documenting them in a secret folder on her phone.
Samantha Lavin, 26, waived

her right to anonymity to reveal how her encrypted notes outlined Patrick Orme's sickening assaults and coercive control between 2016 and 2018.

During her terrifying ordeal,

But Orme's abuse is now at an end after he received a two-year sentence, with the last six months suspended, at Castlebar Circuit Court, after subjecting Samantha to a "cruel, degrading and violent regime" during their relationship.
Orme, 27, from Derrynamuck, Ballina, Co Mayo, who also accused his former partner of being a "liar" before pleading guilty to three counts of assault causing harm, is now being held in Castlerea Prison. Following his sentence, Samantha spoke for the first time to reveal her trauma.

She said: "I was beaten, strangled and thrown against a wall — but I am now out the other side.

"Just when the bruises would heal, he would give me fresh ones.

"We were only teenagers when we met and I didn't know anything about controlling behaviour. I always tried to see good in people.

"He also tried to destroy my character by telling everyone I was a liar but, in the end, he pleaded guilty because he'd no other choice due to the evidence against him.

"The outcome of the court process is vindication of my decision to come forward and my focus now is on rebuilding my life.

"Even if one woman speaks up about coercive control my decision to come forward will have been worthwhile."

Samantha also said: "I kept the folder on my phone because I had absolutely no idea when this abusive behaviour was going to stop.

"His violence was escalating and, although he kept saying sorry after every attack, I still kept these notes.

"My willpower was broken down due to his controlling behaviour, but when I finally left him and came forward, I knew I had the evidence to prove that I was telling the truth all along."

At Orme's sentencing hearing, Judge Eoin Garavan said: "His anger grew and the level of violence grew. The images of some of the injuries caused were horrific.

"This man is a thug. He fully deserves prison and is the author of his own misfortune.
"He bullied and savagely assaulted her repeatedly.
"Her actions in coming forward can give hope to others."

The former couple met in 2015, when he was 18 and she was 17. It wasn't until September 2016 when Samantha started to notice signs of his controlling behaviour.

"I was constantly told by him that I was ugly and no one else would have me, but my determination to continue with the case has been completely vindicated."

The assault victim also paid tribute to the Garda investigation team, led by Det Garda Michael McGrath from Ballina Garda Station, for their support during her ordeal.

She added: "I can't commend the Gardai enough for the way they han-"

dled this case and they were with me every step of the way."

And she also praised her family and friends for their support after ther decision to come forward.

# 336 ops abroad at cost of €11m

A TOTAL of 336 Irish people have had surgical operations abroad so far this year at a cost to the State of €11.1million, the HSE has revealed.

Patients opted to do so under the Treatment Abroad Scheme as procedures were not available in this country or in the time normally necessary to get it done here.

It didn't specify the type of procedures.

Out of those who applied, 29 people had their applications declined.

The HSE said Germany, Sweden, Belgium, Italy and France treated the most Irish patients.

It also revealed that 1,189 patients received treatment under the Cross Border Directive.
To qualify, you must be an Irish resident and entitled to public healthcare in Ireland.
A service user must pay for any healthcare they get abroad but can apply for reimbursement.
