Things I have learned about grief

It is my nephew's birthday. He is six. Or does he remain five forever? I am not sure what the appropriate ageing convention is for buried children. This is new territory to navigate.

The immediate year after the death of someone you love is a nasty mix of the familiar feeling unfamiliar. It is a hard 12 months of "firsts" - first Mother's Day without them. First Father's Day. Birthdays. Then there's the number one big awful Christmas. That month-long season where happy clappy families scurry around buying toys and stress about letting an aunt who thinks salt is "too spicy" be in charge of the side dishes, while you're just trying not to cry at the empty place at the

What you should know about my nephew is that he achieved and endured more in his five short years than most of us spread out over a lifetime. Then one day last year he stopped breathing with no warning, and we have been doing our best to get along without him ever since. I am coping, but at least once a day I feel like putting my fist through a window and yelling

A few years ago, Helen Garner, the peerless Australian author, released her diaries written during the breakdown of her marriage due to her ex's infidelity. I wolfed them down, never one to pass up the chance to have a nosy poke around someone's relationship scraps.

"This will have to be lived through," she wrote about her pain. There was no alternate route around. No distractions. No avoiding. That sentence hit me in the gut because I knew it was true, and there was no way out of life's big sadnesses. The ones that sit on your chest and squeeze like a bastard. So I sit with grief and let it have its way with me. There is no speeding up the process, it will finish when it's ready.

Here are a few things I've learned about grief, and what is and isn't helpful for people going through it.

- There are only so many sympathy flowers a house can fit, plus they require vases and clean water before they are guiltily stuffed in the overfilled brown bin when they die. Send food instead. People need to be fed, but they don't have the brain space for the "what will we have for tea" daily torture. There are loads of tasty and healthy premade catering services that do online orderslasagnes always go down a treat.

- It's petty, but you can't help but remember who was there for you and who backed away like death was infectious. Who came with assorted gifts, not so much to cheer you up (because what could?), but just to have something to do with

their hands in an awkward situation. Who didn't know what to say but tried anyway. No one expects you to say a magic combination of words to make it all better. No such words exist. But a friendly nod from the back of the funeral, a hand on the shoulder, anything to say "I know you are

-Some people are no good at death. They will avoid you. They will be frustrated you aren't "getting over it" in a way that is convenient to them. It will bring out a feral hurt and anger in you, but it's important to remember this is more about them than you. Your grief reminds them of their own grief, one they have been putting off processing themselves. People who steer clear of "bad vibes" are usually just afraid of their own feelings, the ones they pretend aren't there.

when to make me socialise; such as one who threw a party in my own house for New Year's Eve because then I would have to go. And friends who knew when and how to climb down into the dark hole with me just so I would have company at the bottom. Having both has been a gift.

- If you want to spend Christmas alone, do it. Taking breaks to cry in the loo at someone else's normal cheerful Christmas is hell. Now not only do you feel sad, you also feel incredibly guilty about it. You want to shout "Will you all bugger off and leave me alone with the Milk Tray?" but you are also trying not to be the Grinch that ruined Christmas by spewing your sadness all over the place. Gorgeous Glendalough



Is ChatGPT just pretending to be stupid?



Do I have to explain what ChatGPT is? If you're unfamiliar, you can google it. Because, in a way, it's the new Google.

When you log in to the new artificial intelligence chatbot, it's quite ordinary. I would have preferred some momentous-sounding intro music, just to prepare me to face this sci-fi God. Hello Dave, everything's running smoothly. But it's no HAL.

Of course, I asked about me, and it told me that I was born in Birmingham (I wasn't), that I grew up in Wexford (nope) and that I'm the author of The Sneaky Chef: How to Cheat on Your Man (In the Kitchen), which old-fashioned Google says was written by an American woman called Missy Chase Lapine. I would never cheat on my man, in the kitchen or anywhere else.

I was mildly insulted. Not so much because it got a lot wrong: it was more a sense that this supposed totem of world-changing human ingenuity couldn't be arsed to look up Wikipedia.

This isn't my first encounter with artificial intelligence; nor yours either. Those dialogue boxes that often pop up on websites, usually featuring a smiley human head, are also powered by AI. You're trying to find out if that parcel has been lost in the post or why you're sudden-

Al gets things wrong. A lot. It absorbs the biases of its programmers, and it seems to lack an ability for nuance, context and empathy ly €5,000 overdrawn, and the AI will politely tell you what you know already, while maintaining the fiction that it is somehow helping you.

But this is the future. AI is already being used in various manufacturing processes, the sorts of things that require doing a lot of sums quickly. Which is fine. But it's also encroaching into the muddier area of human interaction. It has a role in deciding who can get bail in parts of the US court system. It's used in facial-recognition technology. For sifting through CVs. I'm far from an expert in these matters, but, rather like ChatGPT, that won't stop me expressing an ill-informed opinion: in its human-facing interactions, AI gets things wrong. A lot. It absorbs the biases of its programmers, and it seems to lack an ability for nuance, context and empathy-the fundamental things that make us human and influence how we act.

Yet so many companies and government agencies are keen to adopt it, perhaps in the full knowledge that, in many cases, it won't be good as a real person. But it will be quicker. And cheaper. The near future will be a bit more inefficient, but a lot more profitable.

Not everyone is a fan. A lot of scientists and tech bros are warning that we should pause AI research in case we inadvertently trigger a Skynet situation. And even at the dumber end of AI, there is concern that students will use ChatGPT to do their homework for them or that it could be put to various nefarious uses. One user talked it into giving the recipe for Napalm.

So, I gave it the only test that I'm qualified to give: write an Irish Times column in the style of Seán Moncrieff.

The drivel it vomited up. Banal and cliche-ridden. No mention of Herself or the number-children. No woke virtue signalling. It kept using the term "musings".

On the first attempt, it opened with 70 words about the weather. So, I gave it another chance, and told it to mention the kids. It claimed that one of them taught me to play Minecraft. On the third attempt, I asked what I might say about artificial intelligence.

It was a stream of platitudes, but ended with these words: let's all stay curious and open-minded as we navigate the brave new world of artificial intelligence.

The stuck to my guns'

DJ Annie Mac has written her second novel, but she's still 'scarlet' at the prospect of being called an author. She talks about London-Irish life, the pull of home, and why she rejected an MBE

've arranged to meet Dubliner Annie Macmanus, the former BBC Radio 1 DJ also known as Annie Mac, in an Irish pub called Maggie's Bar in north London to discuss her second novel, The Mess We're In. Arriving early to the Kensal Rise hostelry, I can't help noticing the similarities between this pub and the one described in the book. It's called Fahy's and is also run by a woman with short grey hair, like the woman behind this bar. There's racing from Bellewstown on the pub's televisions and plenty of Guinness in the taps. The owner's friendly dog wanders around, and on this rainy London afternoon the mostly male, older clientele are sitting in small groups or on their own, nursing pints. It's April, but the ceiling is still hung with green, white and orange balloons left over from St Patrick's Day.

Macmanus arrives wearing an orange jumper, instantly recognisable from her mop of brown curls and bright, lively blue eyes. She is, as I'd expect from listening to her podcast Changes, open and friendly, going up to the bar to order us glasses of Guinness, or "halves" as Macmanus puts it. "If I said 'glasses' here they wouldn't understand me."

The pub was her idea. She's a proper local here now, having made a decision to integrate herself more in her local community while writing her new book. The podcaster and author lives a few minutes down the road. She brings her children here sometimes to watch football or play

darts. Her husband, the DJ and music producer Thomas Bell, known professionally as Toddla T, is sober and not keen on pubs generally but "this place has got more of a community centre feel". She is friends with a few local mothers from the school gates – some local trivia is that the first series of Sharon Horgan's Motherland was filmed in this area. Macmanus and her school mum friends meet in Maggie's Bar now for pints and bacon fries, preferring this refreshingly no-frills environment to some of the area's more salubrious gastropubs.

In her new novel, set at the turn of the millennium, the young protagonist, Orla Quinn, works part time in an Irish bar while living in a dilapidated, mouse-infested house a few streets away from here in "County Kilburn". Her housemates are newly signed rock band Shiva and her best friend, Neema, as she tries to figure out how to break into the music industry. Macmanus was hugely inspired by Sylvia Plath's The Bell Jar, "this idea of a young girl coming to a city, with big aspirations, big dreams, and kind of getting the fucking wind knocked out of her sails". The novel, a hedonistic, drug-fuelled, gritty coming-of-age story, is a love letter to London as seen through the eyes of an immigrant. It also explores themes that preoccupy many Irish people in this and other cities abroad: displacement, belonging, identity,

Macmanus has been grappling with these subjects herself lately, wondering whether she will stay in her adopted home or move with her family back to Ireland. She has spoken about how turning 40 nearly five years ago was a crucial mile-

stone: that sense of time marching on prompted a re-evaluation of her goals. This led to the monumental decision to leave her hugely popular BBC Radio 1 show and her two million listeners after 17 years.

She had wanted to write since she was a child, and that leap "from curator to creator" saw her taking a writing course, which resulted in a critically acclaimed and best-selling novel Mother, Mother, a dark yet hopeful family saga set in Belfast, where she had studied contemporary Scottish literature and dabbled in poetry.

This is her first time talking about the new novel. "When I started doing interviews about Mother, Mother, the first question everyone asked is: where did this book come from? And I genuinely didn't know. So I knew that this time it would probably be a good idea to think about what I wanted to write. What do I want to explore? What is meaningful to me? I know it sounds very basic."

What emerged was that she wanted to explore the experience of being Irish in England. And having just recently stepped out of the music industry—the chapters of The Mess We're In are all named after songs—she wanted to explore that, too. When she first arrived in London, she lived with a rock band on the other side of the city.

"There were a couple of years that were really formative. I wanted to fictional-



•• ise it but also to try to remember as much of it as I could.'

In addition to The Bell Jar, two other books inspired her while writing The Mess We're In. Hangover Square by Patrick Hamilton taught her how to write about pubs, she says. There is a "Bar staff wanted" sign outside Maggie's Bar, and she seriously considered taking a job here to immerse herself in Orla's experience, but in the end "I just frequented it a lot". The other book, An Unconsidered People: The Irish in London by Catherine Dunne, was important in terms of the diaspora story. "There's literally a dying generation of Irish people who came over to London after the war - a lot of them got stranded here and couldn't go back. There's sadness there and a real sense of isolation and loneliness.

She depicts this beautifully in the novel, with Irish barfly characters contributing some of the book's most affecting moments. "We don't all get the luxury of belonging where we're born," one of them

As she spoke to regulars in these north London Irish bars, such as The Coopers Arms in Kilburn, the pub scenes in the book "grew and grew. And I realised that this book is really about being Irish in England. And exploring who the f**k am I? How Irish am I? What does it mean to me to be Irish? Where do I belong? All of that stuff which is so prevalent for anyone who doesn't live in Ireland any more. The kind of neither-here-nor-thereness of it all.'

She describes a recent Saturday afternoon visit to Maggie's Bar. "My oldest, who is nine, was playing darts with a regular. I was sat with Maggie having a pint, and my youngest, who is six, was just sat at the bar, like an oul wan, for half an hour. But that actually meant so much to me, like profoundly. It scares me how much it meant. Like, what does it mean?"



Writing the book coincided with a point when she was thinking a lot about whether she should be going home for good. "So that thought was there all the way through, meeting different Irish people abroad from different generations and really trying to interrogate this whole idea of emigration and this idea of going home, which is not something I've ever thought about until now. And I'm not Orla, but I really wanted to show how I was at that time when I first came to England, going away without looking back, even once. With not even a thought of what you're leaving behind."

She mentions a "threshold" moment, which happened a couple of years ago,

where she realised she had lived in England longer than she had lived in Ireland. "It felt really significant. And you start asking all these questions." During the pandemic she wrote an article for this newspaper about homesickness. "That was the beginning of me really thinking about going home, because it was the first time I had head space as an adult, I'd made time for myself, which was lovely and that coincided with Covid and not being able to see my family and then writing this book, it all kind of amplified in my head.'


Her trips home have steadily increased. She always goes at Christmas or Easter. and for a month in the summer with the children, but these days she also goes

alone, just for a day and a night, to spend quality time with her parents. Her mother is 81, and her dad 76. "One little day with them on my own is like two weeks there with the kids," she says. "It scratches that itch."

We're talking about all of this, about identity and home, when she casually drops the news that last summer she was offered an honorary MBE for "services to broadcasting". She finds the email on her phone and reads out the message from the "director of protocol, foreign commonwealth and development office ... she proposes to submit your name to Her Maiesty the Oueen as an honorary Member of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire". The email asked if she would consider accepting.

The first thing Macmanus did was google Irish people who had accepted and rejected similar offers. "There are a lot of Irish people who turn them down." She didn't say no straight away. "I thought it would be disrespectful not to consider it. It made me think about my place in the world, my allegiances. I was never in any doubt about the absurdity of the monarchy, but it made me think about all of that."

The offer led to some deep conversations with family and friends. It's not as though Macmanus will be celebrating today's coronation of King Charles, but on the other hand she is conscious of how much Britain has given her. She recalls her mother's response. "She was saying 'England has been so good to you, look what it's given you: it's given you a husband, a job in the most amazing institution of British media, it's given you a happy home, it's given you friends for life.' Macmanus's response? "I was like, 'All right, Mum, Jesus Christ," she laughs. "Because she's right, you know. It really did make me look at things differently. It didn't make me accept it, though."

Her rejection reply was polite. "I emailed them back and said I really appreciated it and that it was an honour to be asked but I didn't feel right about accepting. It's the language of it, basically. The

monarchy just feels quite absurd to me. It didn't sit right."

In her response she said she didn't agree with the language, particularly with the word "empire". "I said if they ever change the way they do the honours, then to get back to me, but right now the system just doesn't work ... I haven't told anyone until now." Ventilating these issues in an Irish newspaper is probably less loaded than in the British press, she reckons.

How does she feel about quitting her job at the BBC now, nearly two years on? "It still feels new. It feels amazing to have been able to have the space and the choice to do it, to be able to walk away from a job like that. It's not something I take for granted."

It felt good to "take control and steer the ship" of her life. She knew as soon as she called her boss with the news that it was the right decision. "It just felt so good. I hadn't really felt trapped or anything – the BBC is a bloody lovely place to work – but I've never not had a boss since I was 15, so for me to not have a boss and have an agenda to work towards [IS]something that I'm still just really appreciating."

There are downsides, of course. "The

There are downsides, of course. "The thing about working for radio and the BBC is that you are immediately in the middle of this huge world and community and you are a conduit of beautiful music and you feel connected. So I've really felt this lack of community ... Writing can be lonely and isolating. You spend all day on your own rattling around the house. I found that aspect, as a natural extrovert, really hard to do. In the book Orla is trying to find a sense of belonging and home in a city. But I was also trying to do that by coming to places like this and interviewing Maggie and integrating a bit into the community."

Macmanus arrived in London in 2001, the year Brian Dowling won Big Brother. "A very different time," she laughs. In the novel, which is set around the same time, Orla is dealing with a lot of issues at home. Her father has left her mother and is living with another woman. There's a sense that she is running away not just from her life in Ireland but from herself, from the problems she doesn't want to face. A scene at a music festival, where she has a sexual experience she can't quite remember, is powerful.

"She's deeply ashamed and annoyed with herself about it, but like a lot of things that Orla does, she doesn't allow herself to sit in that place very long ... I think I kind of wrote her as being someone who's neurodiverse. Not that you would have ever [have been diagnosed as that] in the year 2000 or 2001. But she is someone with a lot of the characteristics of female ADHD. She's not very good at emotional regulation. And she's quite chaotic. She can't seem to just organise those basic things."

Orla couldn't be further away from Macmanus in this regard. Something that comes up a lot in interviews is the fact that she actually likes herself. Some interviewers, particularly women, have found this natural confidence remarkable. Where does the confidence come from? "This is the bit that I always find really hard to answer because I'm not used to thinking about myself at all in an introspective way. I've never done therapy. My friend has just moved back here after being in New York

for 10 years. And she was like, How the f**k are you not in therapy? Like, everyone in their 40s should be in therapy. And I said, 'well, I just don't like thinking about myself' and she was like, 'Go to therapy. Clearly you need to go to therapy, if you don't like thinking about yourself'."

She's not completely averse to the idea. "But I don't want to force it. No, if I feel like I will, then I will. I'm all ready to go now. Like, as menopause comes in, I've started feeling a bit sweaty." Thinking a little bit more about her own confident nature, she credits her parents. "I was left alone a lot as a kid in a very good way. I was provided with a lot of love and a feeling of safety but I was allowed to form my own identity in my own way and in my own time ... My parents are amazing."

Her confidence, no doubt, has helped when making some of her more significant life changes. Leaving the BBC, for example, and stepping away from (AMP) Annie Mac Presents, her production company that ran events with large audiences including her music festival, Lost & Found Malta.

"I've stopped doing that ... I'm bowing out of all of the events that I used to do. That world was me as a curator of music, and it tied in so well with me on the radio. I don't do that any more. Also, it's a lot of responsibility. I really felt that as I've got older, this kind of burden of responsibility of being the figurehead behind an event where loads of young people are coming out getting rat-arsed, and I'm just too scared of somebody getting hurt."

There is far less chance of that at Before Midnight, her new rave nights for people who like dancing but also enjoy a good night's sleep. Demand has exploded for these events, which start at 7pm and end at the Cinderella hour – there's a 10-date tour of the UK and Ireland in the offing. "It's been so unexpected and such a rebirth," she says. "I'd kind of written off DJing. I saw myself fizzling out. And now we're trying to find a venue in New York."

Then there is the podcast Changes, where she interviews celebrities about life-changing moments. She enjoys it but admits that it's "a slog. Podcasts are really hard work. It's a congested industry."

Does she feel like a writer now, with her second book out in the world? "I'm still not actually able to say that word. If someone asked me what I do, I'd probably say, 'I'm a DJ and I write books'. If someone calls me a writer, I would be scarlet in the best possible way. I'd be so embarrassed. I am also talking to myself every day, saying it probably won't do well. And that's fine. Because the process itself was really enjoyable. And whatever it is, I'll learn and I hopefully will improve over time. I'm new, I'm learning. I would love to be seen as a writer, and I'd love to be considered that. But, you know, I've got a lot of work to do."

For now, publicity for The Mess We're In is taking priority. The book launch is happening here, in a downstairs area of Maggie's Bar, which the proprietor no longer uses for public events but is opening especially for Macmanus. Her first book was launched "in a fancy hotel but this time we're doing it with lots of Taytos and Guinness". Interestingly, she doesn't feel a weight of expectation with her second novel. "I haven't felt that pressure to have to sell loads of books. It's kind of lovely in that I can just write a bit more of what I want. And with this book, I've done that more than ever, I think I've stuck to my guns."

And of course Annie MacMacmanus, MBE refusenik, is still ruminating on a permanent return home to Ireland. The youngest of four, she's the only one of her siblings currently living away. There are issues to consider: her eldest son will be

starting secondary school in a year and a half, and her husband's work is mainly in rap music and reggae.

"While Ireland is diversifying, there's not much of an industry for that music in Ireland so he'd have to travel over here the whole time ... Is it better for me to be going over on my own and keep everyone in their comfortable place here and just go over on the holliers, or is it better to relocate everyone there? It's hard," she sighs. "Sorry, this is like a therapy session," says the woman who has never done therapy. "My husband is from Sheffield so here is neutral for us. In Dublin that wouldn't be the case."


There is also the matter of her two very English children. "I hadn't actually psychologically prepared myself for it, the amount of times I tell them, 'it's baath not bawth'," she says, laughing.

"But that's the reality ... They really see themselves as English. And sometimes things happen that really hammer that home, like the Euros and, you know, they've got their English flags, their Union Jacks and as an Irish person, you are recoiling ... and you have to be cool. They take the piss out of me and I take the piss out of them."

She says she took "so much solace" from being an Irish person during Brexit. "What I always say to the kids is, if anything happens, we're gone. Home. Yeah. It's always home. They know that."

Crafting a future for lost skills

An upcoming exhibition and festival will tell the stories of the basket weavers, grafters, embroiderers, knitters and other Irish crafters whose skills are in danger of dying out

Basket weaving Michael Foudy

Michael Foudy specialises in a dying craft. Right into the small hours during wintertime, the quiet man carefully and deliberately weaves willow branches by hand. Baskets, flower pots and the likes – whatever takes his fancy that week. A muffled radio beside him soon becomes a faraway distraction to the measured task at hand.

"Your mind would go off completely, on weaving or whatever," the 66-year-old says. "Since I retired, then I've had more time on my hands, making them away in the winter."

At his house in the small village of Ruan, Co Clare, he keeps little secret of his hobby. Hand baskets dotted around, weaved ornaments hanging on the walls and a small hanging basket holds some leaves with an ornamental robin perched atop. In his garden, a bike leans up against the house, baskets front and back with bright red, pink and purple flowers protruding; and a freestanding willow trellis spirals high among the foliage, ready to support sweat peas when the time comes.

"My father used to make baskets, so I'd have watched him up along and I'd have made some a good number a years ago," he tells The Irish Times. "Later on then, I suppose – you see time is going so fast –

we'll say 30 years ago, I made a few more, getting more experienced on it."

Born in 1957 ("I'm still very young!"), his is a craft once ubiquitous across Ireland, but now relegated to an ornamental pursuit. Foudy was reared on a farm with eight in the family, where baskets were commonplace, but already the use of the coveted turf basket was dying off.

"T'was always involved with my hands," he says of his career as a linesman for Eircom. "That'd be my line more than a computer we'll say."

With natural resources aplenty in Co Clare, Foudy picks wild willows from Inagh and various country lanes in west Clare, taking about 12-14 hours per basket depending on how many handles are needed. All he knows, he learned from his father, the television and the odd book from the library.

T'was always involved with my hands. That'd be my line more than a computer we'll say "You pick them when the leaves are off at the end of the year, maybe December or January we'd say, before they start to produce their leaves again. You save them for about three months. If you want to, you can keep them to the year after and steep them in water, but usually it's the fresher ones I use It's kind of hard on the fingers, on the hands, you know? You just get them before they go too hard, you know? You'd just have a couple of cutters and a knife – the whole idea is just to give it shape – four or five instruments would do you altogether.

"If you get yourself an old bike, with a basket on and flowers on it – it reminds you of bygone days kind of thing, you know?"

To pass on his skills, he runs basket weaving classes to pass on his knowledge to the next generation.


"You go into the room with a bunch of willows – a couple dozen or whatever – you show the people how to make something with their hands, and they're really happy when something turns out and they're walking out the door with the basket."

Despite the fading prominence of basket weaving in Irish society, with the takeover of factory-made clones long complete, he's optimistic.

"I think there'll always be an interest,"

















he says. "You'll always find someone that will do the craft. I don't think it will ever really die away, but I think the baskets are more of an ornament now rather than general use. I think people will still take it on as a hobby for winter – something to do, like. If people had someone to show them how to do it, you'd get a class no problem."

Foudy is part of an upcoming exhibition and festival in the nearby town of Ennistymon next weekend, dedicated to the preservation of traditional and sustainable crafts no longer commonplace in Irish society.

"It's a festival of lost skills," says Fionn Kidney, co-founder of Common Knowledge, a non-profit social enterprise. "Really our aim with Rekindle is to celebrate the skills held by older people and to create an opportunity to introduce them to new generations.

"We've become disconnected with the world around us in contemporary society. There's lots that's been really helpful with technology and advances we've made, but often it's disconnected us from nature and the resources that are all around us."

The Embers exhibition captures

Foudy's story, and others like him, in an effort to inspire people to think locally and connect with other generations on these crafts which are slowly fading into the history books. Funded by the Arts Council, Clare County Council and the older persons programme with Community Foundation Ireland, Embers tells these stories through a combination of photographs, recorded interviews, oral storytelling, musical performances and live demonstrations, and talks with basket weavers, winterage farmers, apple grafters, farriers, woodturners, sea foragers, oyster catchers, rope makers, Aran knitters, natural dyers and water diviners. Last year's inaugural festival saw 500 visitors from across Ireland.

"All of these areas are largely connected to nature and the environment around us," Kidney says. "For us, celebrating these skills is about celebrating older people, but it's also about celebrating the fact that previous generations were really connected to the world around them in terms of nature and fulfilling their own needs. In today's world, we often fill our needs by buying in what we need from very far away

and paying somebody else to do it.

"Last year [we] brought together a number of musicians who hadn't played publicly in quite a while, long past their retirement. It was a really magic moment at the festival last year, everyone's feet were tapping, sean-nós dancing broke out. People loved seeing these older musicians back out, being celebrated and at the centre of the festival. It really added to the atmosphere."

Knitting and sewing Maura Leamy and Josie O'Brien

Longtime friends Maura Leamy and Josie O'Brien get the giggles when they're together. Although born years apart, the pair are bonded through friendship, place of home and a shared love of their crafts: knitting and sewing. Sewing was once a skill as everyday as riding a bike, and now expert sewers are revered for their crafts-

manship. Born in 1928 in Ballysteen, near the north coast of Co Limerick, O'Brien later married a man in Tulla, Co Clare, where she soon met Leamy, who is nine years her junior. The pair grew up with Singer sewing machines, one operated by foot and the other by hand, and learned the importance of making and darning clothes for six children each in pre-modern Ireland.

Cuimhneamh an Chláir, an independent, voluntary group which digitally records, archives and shares the oral heritage of Co Clare, interviewed Leamy and O'Brien for Embers. The interviews were shared with The Irish Times.

"We were handing down more than anything," O'Brien tells the Cuimhneamh an Chláir researcher. "If you make something, the next [child] would wear it again. It was like that. You'd knit socks, you'd knit gloves and hats – that kind of thing. A little frock maybe if you had the materials. They were hard old times, do you know? You had to make everything."

While rearing her children, she spent her evenings making the dinner over an open fire for the family with her moth-



er-in-law who lived into her 90s, and when the children were put to bed she'd knit and sew into the small hours: some legwarmers here, a hat there, maybe even the odd dress. Without manuals lying about, much of the clothing was made just through judging the work by eye.

Like their mothers before them, O'Brien remembers making bedsheets or even the odd dress from 10st flour sacks: "You'd want to have them coloured and that, like. You'd never want anyone to know they were a flour bag. Everyone was trying to do the best they could."

She also has an extensive rug collection from over the years, with wool gathered from all parts of the country.

"I made one lovely [rug]. T'was navy, and a pink rose in the middle," she says, then pausing for a beat. "And I put it into the washing machine. I should have put it in a pillow or something, but I put it in as it was and [the colours] all came out. Oh I was raging! And all the hours I had spent to do it." Even with a frustrating story like that, she cracks an infectious laugh.

One patchwork blanket for a turf basket stands out in her Tulla home: "That was

only bits of wool for God's sake!... It was only old pieces of wool in the drawer that I knitted together. Honest to God, that's the way it was."

Leamy sees her own talents as almost average, such was the widespread level of skill in her day. "Everybody had these skills," she says.

"There was one particular lady, she was older than my mother, and is no longer with is, she was extremely good. She did everything out of her head, she didn't have any pattern to give her instruction how to do it."

One cherished piece of embroidery on linen, made during a night course when she was 20 years old, still has pride of place in the home, and is only brought out for special occasions for a table. Rose petals, green foliage and red petals are carefully and neatly arranged.

The last time it was taken out was for her parents' 50th wedding anniversary: "There might be something else happening over the next 10 years, if I'm around," she says. "It is very therapeutic. You just love to perfect those certain stitchings. It's not a simple thing –you may think it is easy, but it's not.

"My nine-year-old granddaughter is able to do the knitting. Knitting is going to stay in that house but the other teenagers, there's no interest at all. It's a different thing altogether. The skill is going to die if it isn't renewed and kept on."

Apple grafting Thomas Barry

While retired English teacher Thomas Barry has at least 130 apple trees at his Inagh home, he also has dogs, hens, ducks, two geese (one called Mahatma Gandhi), a donkey named Wilfred, a goat named Mrs White and all manner of plants and insects that call his four-acre garden their home.

Cuimhneamh an Chláir also interviewed Barry for the Embers exhibition. "Donkeys are inclined to criminality, aren't ye?" he jokes with Wilfred in the orchard during the hour-long oral history recording, referring to occasional thefts around the apple trees.

"To keep the grass in the orchard, you have to have it grazed. If you cut it with strimmers, what grows I find are the weeds The old people had solutions for every problem."

His craft? Apple grafting, which involves taking a favoured apple variety and splicing it onto a desirable rootstock to grow a new tree. No doubt few know as many varieties as he does, with his impressive vocabulary full of apple lingo.

"The Blenheim you need to have out by January," he says in his back yard orchard. "That is the best apple I've ever eaten. We used to do the market in Kilrush and take the apples there and my [late] wife [Dorothy], God love her, she loved the market. They used to be queuing up for the Blenheim Orange I had to resort to hiding them away because she wanted to take them all to the market!" Barry laughs with a nostalgic look in his eye. "It is an outstanding apple."

A melodic and well-spoken man, even without prior knowledge of grafting, his grá for the soil beneath his feet and the trees around him is enough to capture attention. For him, the skill of growing and cultivating apples has been lost for some time. He says his parents' generation didn't grow apples, but back in the middle of the 18th century it was a different story.

His father was a farmer who left school at the age of 10 but still had the ability to quote Shakespeare spontaneously and accurately. "He had it, he had this love of language," Barry says, crediting him with his later interest in English.

Barry, a fan of the old ways, has a deep respect for the natural world around him and a keen awareness of environmental damage.

"I loath invasive species or plants that are not native to here," he says, recalling how an invasive plant previously killed one of his goats. "That's why I say to people, grow native. I think for the environment, with the Sitka spruce, it's a disaster [The species is Ireland's most prominent tree in forestry today, and is originally from North America]. If everywhere [where there are] sitka spruce there were native trees, we'd have massive biodiversity – because underneath those things there's a desert. What concerns me greatly is that when I was gardening up in those fields in the '50s and '60s with my neighbour or father, the place was full of insects." Not any more.

"I think, if the lack and destruction of nature above the ground – if it's that's going on in the soil – I think we are in real trouble," he says.

Only recently did he learn the names of Irish insects as béarla [in English], having learned the Irish names in his youth. "Irish is a language that lends itself to farming, the bog."

He says the birds have slowly disappeared in the area due to the deteriorating quality of the grass: "That grass has been going down for the last 70/80 years. The pollinators [ask]: 'Where are the wild bees? There were several varieties of wild bees around.' I don't see them any more. The lack of creatures is so noticeable. I don't have to read about climate change, I can see it."

To compensate for the deteriorating bee population, Barry keeps a hive of honeybees for pollination.

"I fear if I didn't have the hive, I'm certain I wouldn't have a crop," he says. "You'd see the odd one, but to me, the wild bees are gone. There is a compound in weedkiller that destroys the bee's nervous system. And you have what's knowns as colony collapse disorder: the bee goes out and it doesn't come back to the hive. I think it is pesticides, lack of habitat and lack of wildflower meadows. Gone.

"We had an old car in the '60s, and a summer's evening we'd come up from Ennis. The windscreen would be covered with moths. No moths now, they're gone. That should worry people."

He speaks with deep concern over the loss of habitat for birds such as the corn crake, which up to 100 years ago was found in every parish in Ireland. Now, just a few can be found in coastal spots along Galway, Mayo and Donegal.

"I do what I can, but it isn't enough," he says. "We need to have areas set aside A lot of land in Ireland is useless. Just leave it alone. If you leave a piece of land alone, you get trees growing there but they'll self-seed If we leave enough space, these creatures will come back."

While Barry puts in the elbow grease at the orchard, it was his late wife who was the master planner, and often spoke of her fears for the environment long before others. He recalls his wife's rather prescient prediction: "[Insects] are part of the whole system, and when they go, we go. We can't exist on the planet without them."

The Embers exhibition is on in Ennistymon, Co Clare from May 12th to 21st, with Rekindle: Festival of Lost Skills on May 14th from noon to 5pm. An opening celebration for Embers is on May 11th, from 6pm to 8.30pm. Tickets are free from tickettailor.com

A celebration of international culture and cuisine

Global Kitchen pop-up cafes bring taste of home to international communities in Kilkenny

Kilkenny city is a buzzing melting pot of nationalities, both visitors and residents, and a new community initiative there is aiming to promote cross-cultural integration through food. The Global Kitchen celebration of international culture and cuisine is a series of pop-up cafes, bringing the food of Lebanon, Malaysia, Bangladesh, Poland and Romania to the city throughout the year.

The idea came from the success of the Ukrainian Borscht Cafes at the city's Savour Kilkenny food festival and Yulefest last year, which were organised to welcome refugees to the city and help them integrate. "When the Ukrainians arrived, we recognised that a lot of them were in accommodation with food provided so they weren't having the opportunity to eat their cultural dishes," says Sharon O'Gorman of Kilkenny LEADER partnership, the non-profit local development organisation spearheading the project.

The pop-ups each run for one day in the city's Home Rule Club, a social enterprise and cultural hub, and tickets can be bought online for a two-course lunch, cooked by representatives of the host

country, who are living in the city. A Lebanese pop-up served more than 70 people on a recent Saturday and will be followed by a Malaysian Cafe on May 20; a Polish Cafe for the Polska Eire Festival in June, a Bangladeshi Cafe in August and a Cafe for Romanian National Day in November.

Guy Jones is head chef in the kitchen when I visit for the Lebanese pop up. A mechanical engineer by profession, he works with Veolia Water Ireland in Kilkenny and has lived there since 1999. "It was love that brought me to Ireland," he says, introducing me to his Irish wife, Christine. The pair met in Abu Dhabi, where Christine was teaching.

Jones has been promoting Lebanese culture while living in Kilkenny. "I noticed, back in 2001, with the troops coming back from Lebanon, there were no links between Ireland and Lebanon. So, I thought, okay, if my daughter is going to grow up in this environment – and I do not want to indoctrinate my children – what's the best way to create cultural activities? So, I started a project called the Irish Lebanese Cultural Foundation. We have a huge history between Lebanon and Ireland."

He loves to cook the cuisine of his heritage and has brought Lebanese food to the attention of visitors to the Savour Kilkenny food festival, which has been running since 2008. "My idea behind that is that there is a lot of recipes coming out in different magazines speaking about Lebanese food but very rarely and seldom, you will find the genuine recipes, the original recipes. When you try a Lebanese restaurant, if your chef is not Lebanese and his mother and grandmother are not Lebanese, he has not tasted the food as it comes originally; they will never get it

right."

For authentic Lebanese food in Ireland, he has two restaurant recommendations: Mezze in Athlone and Mejana in Limerick. "They were like a breath of fresh air because the chef is Lebanese, everyone there is Lebanese. They know what they are serving."

Jones has help in the kitchen for the pop-up from his daughter, Sophie, and others. "Hasam and Hakim are International Protection asylum seekers from Algeria who arrived in Kilkenny about a

month ago. Everybody is working really well together. It's very positive," says Sharon O'Gorman.

His menu offers a meat and a vegetarian option, along with dessert, and the two-course lunch is priced at \le 13 (or \le 12 plus booking fee if booked online), with O'Gorman pointing out that it is a non-profit event, relying on volunteers. Over a steaming hot cup of cafe blancorange blossom water diluted in hot water - which Jones tells me is a traditional digestif in Lebanon, he explains his menu choices. "Lebanese food is famous for its wide vegetarian range so we have falafel with tahini sauce. The loubieh is famous because in every home, they do this. It's so easy; green beans cooked with tomato sauce.'

The meat lover's choice is kibbeh with cabbage salad and hummus. "Traditionally, it would be a mix of beef and lamb because lamb gives a bit of softness, tenderness. But, I did not use lamb because in Ireland, lamb is very greasy. I don't want to compromise the taste of the beef, as it's very good. A good lean mix is good."

The minced beef is mixed with chopped onions, cinnamon, salt and bulgur wheat and layered up on a baking sheet with more onions, very finely chopped, mixed with pine kernels and Lebanese seven-spice. The bulgur (cracked wheat) is added raw, "so it can soak up the juices from the meat". The kibbeh is topped with olive oil and cooked in a 200 degree oven before being cut into squares to serve.

The cabbage salad accompanying the kibbeh proved more problematic to source ingredients for. It requires a special Middle Eastern type of cabbage. "It's softer. Unfortunately, the white cabbage here, you can bang it against the wall and it will dent the wall," he says. The correct type of cabbage was bought from a halal shop in Tallaght, Co Dublin. The cabbage is chopped finely and crushed garlic, salt, lemon juice and olive oil are added and it is left to soften for a few hours. Then, "happy days", Jones says.

Out in the bar area of the Home Rule Club, the Lebanese lunch is going down well, with the vegetarian option proving to be the most popular. Joanne Lalor is at a table with a group of girlfriends. "I saw it on Twitter and booked it for us. I've eaten

Middle Eastern food before but not in Kilkenny so it is a lovely change and it's lovely to support something in the Home Rule Club. It's a lovely venue and everyone has been so welcoming."

The group said they plan to book tickets for the Malaysian Cafe pop-up, which will take place at the same venue on May 20th. The cooking for that one will be done by Pathma Vasuthevan and tickets are now on sale on the online ticket platform Eventbrite.

Back in the kitchen, Jones and his team are plating up dessert, a spiced pudding called meghli, made with powdered rice and garnished with coconut. He is happy with the way the day has gone and delighted that his Lebanese lunch proved to popular.

"In my opinion, cultural diplomacy is the best diplomacy. If I want to promote Lebanon in Ireland, I will promote it this way, by cooking and sharing Lebanese food. I will not go on TV. I will not go on radio. I will not be talking politics. I will not be talking about the Middle East," Jones

If you are living away from your home place, perhaps unwillingly, the novelty of eating "foreign" foods and trying new things can dissipate quickly, in a cloud of homesickness. In challenging times, what's needed is the comfort of food that is familiar. Sharing that food with others, who might not have tasted it before, can be a source of great pride and stimulate communication, as this excellent initiative is showing.

Head for the hills: A French alpine treat all year long

Cold-water yoga, lunches strewn with flowers and lots of cows: this year-round village in southeastern France is full of natural delights

"Take off your shoes," says Alexia. It has been raining and mud oozes across a forest floor paved in pine needles, beech leaves and rocks. It doesn't look inviting, but we are here to swim in the icy river rushing through the valley base and presumably need to acquaint ourselves with nature and the cold. So we cautiously tread on springy carpets of semi-rotted leaves and needles with mud squelching up through our toes.

Alexia's cold-water toumo yoga is designed to train your head and breath to do something most minds scream "no" to. I assume there will be a special trick or that we'll do such heavy-duty yoga beside the river that our spiking body heat will cry out for the cooling waters. But no. Apart from some warrior and sun-saluting poses, Alexia's cool-prep yoga involves enabling me and my co-dipper to embrace the chilling bath by altering our perception and finding a fire

within.

"Don't fight the river," she says. Somehow we are to relax beneath the biting water. "Do not tense," she says, adding the encouraging words: "I have never had anyone fail to get in." I wonder if I will be her first.

The fourth member of our party elects to be our photographer: aka a flat refusal to even try any immersion. As my feet enter the numbing rapids I try to talk my mind and body out of their rejection of the water. The other two women swan right in, compelling me to follow by making it seem all right. Soon we are up to our necks beneath a small waterfall and it all feels incongruously bearable. Alexia is singing now and asks us to join her: "It will tune us into each other, help the breathing and take your mind off the river." This is one of those times in life when you view yourself from the outside, imagining onlookers smirking at "la, la hippies", but it's brilliant to be out on the edge.

We stay in for three minutes, one for each degree of water temperature, and emerge into a sun-warmed field to drink tea from a flask: "It will warm your insides." Just in case it doesn't do a thorough job we head to The Shed cafe in nearby Le Grand-Bornand – rebranded Grand Bo by the tourist office.

This village – with its 2,000 cows and 2,000 people at a nigh-on 2,000m altitude – is full of artisans keeping on tradition and up with the times. They include Edith and Patrick Martin who perpetuate the heritage of Savoyard pottery in their barn workshop and master saddler Didier Perrillat who produces leatherwork from one of the oldest chalets in town. Those hu-


man-matching cows – from 40 farms in Grand Bo – produce a third of France's Reblochon cheese, which was invented in the region.

This is a year-round village, hosting skiers in winter and artisanals continuously. We experience the short Alp-to-fork supply chain everywhere, including at Chalet de Paccaly

cafe, a 20-minute walk into the mountains from the nearest car park. Here lunch is strewn with wild flowers and herbs, including oregano and thyme, picked from around the restaurant. Hikers of all ages and fitness levels walk on by us throughout the meal, cow bells serenade us and the sun-warmed mountain sends up top notes of sweet grass and a base of earth with a hint of cow dung. If you need the loo you have to head into the nearby woods.

Down in the town of La Clusaz – a favourite with French skiers escaping the more touristy resorts – we eat trout smoked in hay at La Clusaz at L'Ecuelle restaurant from the nearby Thônes lake following a starter of local sheep's milk and courgette.

Distiller Romain Gauthier also sources his ingredients from the mountains. He plants and picks genepi for the Genepi



Berger liquor that his Aravis Distillery has been making since 1876.

"The alcohol really takes on the saveurs," says Gauthier as he swirls a chunky wooden pole through a vat of genepi shoots steeping in alcohol. The plants will soak here for two weeks handing their flavour over to the hooch.

High on the sweet and intense flavours, we waft into the St Alban hotel to be warned that they have no air conditioning. "Saving the world, good," I say. "I'm glad you understand," says the woman at

reception, following the trend for keeping things green and local. "If you would like a fan," she continues, pausing for effect, "open the window."

Already relaxed I am further jellied in the hotel spa by being massaged with plant-scented oils by Nuxe.

On a mountainside above Lake Annecy, Alex Laetitia Hespel knows all about adding plants to cosmetics. She has a special licence to pick wild flowers from high meadows, for use in her own home-made soaps and for beauty compa-

ny Clarins, whose new-generation owners want to keep their plant ingredients as local as possible.

After we walk through the garden above her home, with its rows of aromatic plants, from lush mint and floppy echinacea to strong sage leaves, she hands me thick rubber gloves, an apron and goggles.

I pour volatile caustic soda into water and let it settle before mixing in cocoa butter, olive oil and hypericum oil. The resulting chemical process produces soap and glycerine. Many supermarket soaps, she explains, take out the glycerine and sell it for moisturisers, but she leaves it in her soap to stop skin feeling dry after washing.

We swirl natural colours into the mix, tip the liquid soap into a loaf tin and top it with dried flowers, ready for slicing into bars once it's set.

Plants are so
revered here that in
the Bout du Lac nature
serve near Doussard on Lake Annecy's
southern shore many have been un-



touched since 1975. As we walk we become so immersed in lofty plants my companion cries: "Look, you can see no people except those in the sky," referring to the flocks of paragliders floating towards us from a rocky peak to a waterside landing pad.

From here you can can kayak past the reeds that filter pollutants from water and across to La Cuillère à Omble restaurant that has such confidence in its brilliant

food, mostly hauled from the lake (from faru fish to the eponymous omble) that it has a vibrant but relaxed vibe.

If you want a swisher trip to lunch you can take a water taxi, as we did from Annecy town – where we had climbed to its hilltop chateau to appreciate the landscape, ambled up heaving medieval streets and crossed bridges to see buildings plunging Venice-like into the water.

On our last evening we practically eat

in the lake, with a table right on the water's edge at the Guinguette des Cassines, close to ducks and swans which glide beside us in the vague hope of leftovers.

You are always hard on nature in the Alps and, just as they have for centuries, the locals are making it work and play, while chiming with the current climate for keeping things local and sustainable. annecymountains.com

MaxMara's summer collection embraces neutral tones, linen suits and racer back vests

Luxury clothing brands today are more about accessories than clothes, selling aspirational dreams through lipsticks, handbags and sunglasses rather than expensive garments. Gucci, for example, made 60 per cent of its total revenue in five years to 2017 in leather goods and shoes rather than clothing. And what is more desirable, visible and endurable, a Chanel bag that goes with everything, or a jacket fitting a specific size?

An exception is MaxMara, the Italian family-owned luxury brand founded in the 1950s that is all about the clothes, with accessories playing a no less important but more minor role to the main event. Unlike others, it does not have a history of dispensing with designers, so much a feature of the cut throat contemporary fashion industry, but has kept a former Manchester punk, ex RCA graduate, designer Ian Griffiths firmly in charge as creative director for more than 30 years, ensuring annual sales of over €1 billion and healthy profits of over €200 million.

Well known for its classic but cool low key style, its sustainability credentials are impeccable; materials are natural and renewable. The camel hair used for their coats is collected as the animal naturally sheds, with the surplus used to make insulation for padded jackets – so no down or feathers. As a long-standing fan of the brand, every piece I have has weathered the passing of time and earned its keep, whether a grey winter coat or a striped navy summer trouser suit, and they feel as good as they look.

The story of how Griffiths entered a MaxMara competition as an RCA student and joined the company a year later – and never left – has often been told, and he's on record saying that making real clothes for real people is for him "the most rewarding and satisfying creative experience". He has also argued that classic clothes don't have to be conservative, and that the brand has fundamentally been a radical one since its foundation, when its declared aim was dressing a working woman rather than a lady of leisure.

Best sellers over the years have been the company's aforementioned famous camel



coat, formerly a symbol of male authority, revisited for women, and the fire red Glamis coat worn by Nancy Pelosi that went viral in 2012. A coat, Griffiths asserts, "is a structure that quite literally houses you whilst you're in the street - it offers protection, comfort and of course, prestige".

In the current collection for summer 2023 called The Blue Horizon, he has mined Riviera style of the 1920s for inspiration, citing pioneering Irish furniture designer Eileen Gray "who took on the macho world of the Modernist movement", and her celebrated villa E1027 in Roquebrune Cap Martin as a reference. One of her greatest fans, he has always desired a pair of her Transat chairs, classic pieces of Modernist furniture.

Camel is strong in this collection too and his Instagram posts @ian_griffiths1 highlights what he calls his "Camelandia" style, and shows him sketching designs an oversized coat in pure camel, a bomber jacket with matching pants, or a cocktail dress with a Watteau back.

In this summer collection, the clothes with their neutral tones, wide leg button front flared trousers, linen suits, racer back vests and wide, floppy hats are as relevant now as they were then, when, according to Mary Blume's Cote d'Azur, "men and women dressed alike in wide soft trousers, striped fishermen's shirts, linen jackets and espadrilles". Despite historical references, these clothes are resolutely modern and sophisticated.

Griffiths has always insisted that MaxMara is never about one season. "We want to make things that will last, investments for life, real clothes for real women. I like clothes that grow old gracefully.

Each collection ... if you take it apart is composed of pieces that have a life after the current season" he told WWD recent-

It's a view endorsed by one of Max-Mara's most loyal and enthusiastic Irish customers and a fan of more than 20 years. Dubliner Anne Hearn who inherited a love of fashion from a mother with an assured and confident style, bought her first piece for a wedding when she was pregnant - an off the shoulder linen blouse with a button down front which she wore over a skirt and flat ballet shoes.

After her son was born, she bought a little jacket and trousers, "and I was hooked. Bit by bit over the years I bought fewer pieces from other brands and fell into Weekend as it suited my lifestyle, and I have been buying ever since. I find it refreshing, it never disappoints and the quality is consistent from one year to the next. It is so feminine and suits all ages and is never boring."

Her favourite MaxMara piece is a fitted black wool shift dress, subtly embellished with delicate black silk and chiffon flowers. 'You feel like a film star in it," she says. "And it's the right tone of black for my complexion." Having made clothes herself, she notices the details and how clever and sophisticated the updating of classics can be. Her latest acquisitions illustrate this - a double breast jacket in vanilla jersey ("not off white, not cream but with a hint of pink and perfect over a silk dress"), a houndstooth silk shirtwaister with the skirt pleated on one side, a new take on a familiar style. "You will always find jewels," she sighs.

The best facial SPFs for all skin types and budgets

If you're a skincare enthusiast who spends money on products, it's all a waste of time and cash if you're not wearing SPF

More than 13,000 cases of skin cancer are diagnosed in Ireland each year, according to the Irish Cancer Society, making it the country's most common cancer. While we often don't focus enough on the relationship between aesthetics and health, $\ensuremath{\mathsf{SPF}}\xspace$ is a skin care product that clearly traverses that boundary. It is a healthcare product - one that every dermatologist agrees we should all use daily as a matter of habit, regardless of the weather or our particular skin tone. Apart from protecting our skin from the sun's UV radiation, which causes cell damage and can ultimately cause skin cancer, SPF happens to have excellent aesthetic benefits too.

While SPF is protecting our skin from those UV rays, it is also preventing the premature ageing, pigmentation patches and textural changes that come with them. If you're a skincare enthusiast who spends money on products, it's all a waste if you're not wearing SPF. Without sun protection, we might as well throw every essence, toner, serum and oil in the bin – they can't compensate for the effects of prolonged sun exposure over a lifetime.

With the increase in use of active

ingredients like acids and retinol – which is the gold standard skincare ingredient for everything from breakouts to wrinkles – the need for SPF becomes even greater. Such actives affect the rate of cell turnover in your skin, which is a good thing, but they cause increased UV sensitivity.

Protecting your skin is essential and thanks to increasingly sophisticated formulations, it doesn't have to come at the cost of chalky faces, pilling of your skincare, discomfort or migrating foundation. And, for the love of all that's holy, don't forget your neck and chest.

While I have nothing against a luxury SPF if budget allows, I tend to be less precious about applying sun protection liberally every day if a product is more affordable. CeraVe AM Facial Moisturising Lotion with SPF50+ (€15 at selected pharmacies) remains my daily favourite since becoming a staple in my routine last spring. It has all the benefits of a morning moisturiser but the full protection of an SPF 50. It won't clog pores and it doesn't feel or look slimy or occlusive. It's the best affordable facial SPF I've ever used and works for every age and skin type without leaving any greyish-white veil on the skin.

French pharmacy brands have been making excellent suncare for a long time and **Caudalie Vinosun High Protection**

Every dermatologist agrees we should all use SPF daily as a matter of habit. Photograph: Getty


Cream SPF50 (€32 at cultbeauty.co.uk) has all the markers of an excellent French pharmacy SPF. A slight scent makes it feel more luxurious than a solely functional product but the light texture sets it apart. It's ideal for more mature skin and won't settle or misbehave under make-up.

Sun sensitivity and reactivity is common in Ireland – if you tend to experience a rash, burn very quickly or react to sun cream, **Garnier Ambre Solaire Sensitive Advanced Serum SPF50+ Ceramide Protect** (€26 at Boots) is a great option. This is water-resistant and hypoallergenic but has a light, cooling serum texture designed especially for sensitive skin. There's a version solely for face too but this one works for both face and body.

Dr Sam's Flawless Gossamer Tint (€40 at drsambunting.com) comes in an untinted version but the one with a hint of colour is perfect for make-up-free days. It won't congest or smother the skin, and it has a light texture that makes it a product you can just apply and forget about. It also layers well with other skincare – so no pilling, flaking or separating. •



My wife died over a year ago – how can I imagine life with anyone else?



Dear Roe,

Eighteen months ago, my beautiful wife died. There are still mornings when I wake and struggle with fully comprehending that I will never see her again. We had moved into a new house two years before. I am now a single father to two adorable young children. I do not live near family, but am blessed with very supportive neighbours. I love my job and adore being with my children, but being a single parent can be taxing. Recently, the idea of dating has come into my mind. There are the practical difficulties of how would I possibly squeeze a relationship into what is already a full and hectic life. Greater than that is the emotional difficulty. My wife was beautiful inside and out. She was stunning-looking, had a razor-sharp wit, and would amaze people, even us who knew her, with the volume of knowledge she retained. Hoved every part of that woman from the moment I met her. The issue is that I still do.

When we learned of her illness, we talked of life if things went bad. When I said I could never be with anyone else, she told me it would make her sad to think of me alone. I suppose I would like someone to talk to about my day, to go for a meal with, to get into bed with and wake up beside. The problem is that the only person I want to do this with will never physically be in my life again. I've tried the dating app thing, but no one, no matter how friendly, comes close. I feel not only would I not really be able to commit time to them. I would only ever see them as a replacement, someone to have because I can't have who I want. Is it okay to remain faithful to my wife? When the children do grow, become independent and eventually move away, will I just become a lonely old man like you see in Christmas ads?


I'm so sorry for your loss. The love you have for your wife radiates from your words. Many people dream of having someone love us that much, to describe us as lovingly, to feel as seen and appreciated and adored as you do your wife.

It feels vital to remember that your wife's death is still incredibly recent. Your life has been hugely altered and you're still adjusting to life without her, and the hectic life of a working single parent – I wonder how much time you've even had to simply be still and process. Remember that grief is not linear - it hits us in waves and affects us in different ways over time. And the love you have for your wife and the desire for some companionship aren't at odds with each other. You can love and miss your wife deeply and still want to have someone to share your days with. Humans are social creatures, but sadly so much of modern life is designed to try to erase that need and pretend that the "best", most "optimised" version of ourselves is like a self-cleaning oven, keeping ourselves completely independent and self-contained. This isn't how we are built. We need each other.

It strikes me that your wife died during the pandemic, which was a time when we were all realising the depth of how much we need each other, both in daily life and for life's big transformative moments. The reason the limits on gathering for events such as funerals affected us so deeply is that when we go through something life-altering like a death, we need to gather together to witness each other not only in our grief but in the transformation. Someone we love has died, this has altered our worlds in different ways and we need to acknowledge and accommodate our emotions, our new realities, our new needs.

I hope you feel comfortable both asking for help and possibly seeking out new communities where you can openly talk about your loss. This could look like asking family and friends to visit you, or to babysit so that you have time to socialise, attend counselling, or engage in whatever self-care you need. Asking for help is a way to strengthen your relationships by telling people what you need, letting them help you, and giving you some time to yourself so that you can rest, recharge and be the best version of vourself for you and your children. You could also get a therapist or a specialised grief counsellor, or even seek out grief support groups where you will be able to connect and share with people who have also lost spouses, so that the nuance and complexity of your experience can be met with real understanding and empa-

As for dating or seeking companionship, you can if you want to. You know what you are ready for, and if all you can handle right now is asking to spend some



You know what you are ready for, and if all you can handle right now is asking to spend some time with someone for some conversation and some company, that's fine. Be honest about that up front, and move slowly

time with someone for conversation and company, that's fine. Be honest about that up front, and move slowly.

One thing I will urge you to try to resist doing is thinking about dating in terms of comparison to your wife. No-one can replace your wife, and no-one is asking you to – both because people are not irreplaceable or interchangeable, and because you had an entire marriage with children; imagining that any date or new connection could come close to evoking the intimacy of that would be absurd. So don't place that impossible standard on yourself or anyone else.

You're not looking to try to recreate what you had with your wife. You're acknowledging that your life has changed and seeing how other people can fit into your life now in a way that honours where you are emotionally, and brings you some deserved joy and comfort. And if, over time, you find that you want more from those connections or feel more ready to give more of yourself emotionally, then you can do so.

No-one can tell you what to do with your life, but one thing I would urge you to examine is the idea of remaining "faithful" to your wife. What would it mean to be faithful to her spirit, and her wishes for you and your family? What would it mean to embrace and appreciate the joy, love, spark, connection and inspiration that she brought to your life, and value it in a way that doesn't shut you down to the possibility of connecting with others, but instead encourages you to bring that forward?

What would you like your children to learn about love from you - that losing someone means not trying again, or that you can love someone with your whole heart forever, and also expand your heart to make room for other connections, other experiences, other loves? What would it mean to teach them that you can respect someone who has died by appreciating life whole-heartedly, grasping onto every spark of joy, every chance for love, and valuing all types of connection with others-families, friendships, romancesbecause you have learned how much other people can change and enrich your life? Do this, and no matter whether you meet someone new to love romantically, you will never be lonely.

Why is an oil company sponsoring a high-profile children's art competition?

Offaly man and woodworker Tom

Roche is a long-standing activist. He founded Just Forests in 1989, well before the idea of a social enterprise was born. Stewardship is a word that he thinks about a lot, and his kinship with fellow woodworkers wherever there are forests. We should be stewards not extractors.

He set his sights on the Texaco Children's Art Competition a number of years ago. Why is a fossil fuel company allowed to sponsor such a high-profile children's art competition, he asked? The competition has produced dazzling art. I have been that parent marvelling at the talent of children the same ages as mine where our own efforts were still at the finger-painting stage.

Longevity has grown like moss over what we think of as an Irish institution, 69 years on the go. There's nothing wrong with celebrating talented young artists. But the real winner every year has been the Texaco oil brand and its US parent company Chevron.

Working with documentary maker Peadar King and human rights activist Colm Regan last month, Roche launched SpoArts Washing calling out an uncomfortable truth. Fossil fuels don't deserve the soft focus that sponsorship deals can bring. We need to be clear-eyed about the urgency of ending fossil fuel extraction, and Texaco's sports and arts sponsorships give it a halo of community, putting it into the hearts of parishes, playing pitches and schools.

"Chevron is a class apart in how it just wields very sophisticated tools of greenwashing," New York lawyer Steven

Donziger told the launch webinar, speaking from his apartment where until almost exactly a year ago he was under house arrest, wearing an ankle brace after Chevron pursued him through the courts following his work on behalf of indigenous communities in Ecuador. They are masters at "penetrating the information ecosystem", Donziger said.

The UN Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) has called out the advertising and PR businesses for their role in delaying the urgent shift away from fossil fuels. "Advertisement and brand-building strategies may also attempt to deflect corporate responsibility," the IPCC has said.

This year France has banned fossil-fuel advertising. Last year 350 advertising and PR firms joined a movement called Clean Creatives, refusing to work for fossil fuel firms or their trade associations.

Sponsorship buys "social licence" to continue polluting activities. We are the society that is granting this licence and it's up to us to withdraw it. Kudos to all the brilliant artists and winners over the decades. None of this takes from the beauty of their achievements. But it's up to us as citizens, parents, teachers, editors and journalists to find a better way to reward the talent of our youngest artists and local sports teams.

Restaurant Review Corinna Hardgrave



Just a few degrees from Michelin dining

This will be an odds-on favourite thanks to dishes cooked with precision

A white rectangular carapace of a

building is, I discover, home to the Club at Goffs – Kildare's newest place to dine. Inside, there's a modest hotel reception area to the right and to the left, a bar which merges into the restaurant space. It could have been designed for an out-of-town Radisson hotel. The television is attracting a small audience, the results of a race no doubt.

Booths and large tables run along each side, with a double strip of comfortable two-seater booths tracking through the middle. We're seated at the far end of the restaurant, with a bird's-eye view of the spacious kitchen behind glass, the entrance to the toilets ("fillies" and "stallions") and a service station. As the evening progresses, the room fills up with a serious amount of glam arriving for the 8pm tables. The Kildare pack have a sense of occasion.

Dare I say it but there's nothing on the menu to frighten the horses. Snacks of olives, smoked almonds, croquettes, a tartlet and oysters lead the field; with crab, carpaccio, burrata, scallops and cured Clare Island salmon on the small plates section. Lamb, beef, monkfish and spiced cauliflower, plus roast duck for two, are the five main course options.

To be fair, it's a menu that will please most people and any misgivings I had about it being a shade predictable dissipate with my very first bite of a sautéed Castletownbere scallop (€20). It is cooked so precisely, I immediately glance up at the kitchen. Derry Clarke (of now closed L'Ecrivain) and James Sheridan (formerly of Canteen) are at work with a brigade of chefs, harnessing every single scrap of their experience. French asparagus is a beautiful accompaniment to those scallops and the bisque, dotted with morels and finished with a foam, is exquisite.

There is bread on hand, Ballymore



Organics sourdough and Guinness bread, which goes beautifully with the Kilmore Quay crab (€18). It's a sizeable portion, visible beneath the pretty, opaque slices of finely cut radish.

Sallyanne Clarke does her thing, dropping by every table, chatting to diners, many of whom she clearly knows.

A Domäne Wachau Grüner Veltliner

(€45), from a substantial, leather-clad list that has a few bottles below €40 and plenty by the glass, is crisp and refreshing with the fish starters and the monkfish (€38) that follow. Seared golden, the monkfish comes with a truly delicious beurre blanc. Clams, mussels, capers and tomato, tumbled on top of a grilled leek, add to the dish.

Rump of Slaney Valley lamb (€34) is blushing pink, accompanying sweetbreads are soft and tender and pureed squash has a hint of tarragon and a load of butter; you may well have licked this one off your plate back in the day in L'Ecrivain. Again, the sauce is pitch perfect. We have ordered a side of chips (€6) but would have been fine without them as the portions are generous.

Desserts sound fairly straightforward, although "horse choux" (€12) is intriguing (and yes, there are horsey puns by the furlong). A crisp choux, topped with torched meringue comes with a quenelle of hay-smoked cremeux and slices of banana glazed with a whiskey caramel. It's a dazzling dessert – the work of pastry chef, Elizabeth Derby (not a pun), who was clearly bred for the job.

The bill arrives and I soon realise that I missed something in the elf-sized print at the end of the menu: "A discretionary

gratuity of 10% will be added to your bill and is divided fairly between the staff." Had I spotted it, I would have asked for it to be removed and, instead, tipped in cash. It is the only way that you can be sure that the service charge goes where you intend it to go. I should emphasise that I have no reason to believe that the distribution of service charge here is anything other than fair but how it is paid should be at the discretion of the diner. And I reckon that the patrons at Goffs are flaithiúil enough when it comes to a share of the purse.

Small print aside, Kildare's newest restaurant is impressive. The room is unremarkable, yet comfortable. The prices are punchy but relatively good value, and the dishes, though mainstream, are delicious and cooked with precision.

It is very fine bistro food with just a few degrees of separation from Michelin dining, which is hardly surprising when you have Derry and Sallyanne Clarke involved.

Dinner for two with a bottle of wine and inclusive tip was €190.85. ●

A deliciously fresh taste of Peru from a food truck

What's on offer?

On his day off chef Michelangelo Dalla Pieta and his partner, Rochi De Las Casas, pitch their Peruvian food truck at the splendid Merrion Square food market. They see it as an opportunity to introduce Irish people to traditional Peruvian food, a cuisine that takes influences from China, Japan, Africa, Italy, Spain and the Incas of Peru.

The short menu is chalked on a board and typically includes two types of ceviche, the Peruvian marinated fish dish that traditionally is only eaten at lunchtime. There are also stews and a Peruvian croquette with mashed potato and beef.

What did we order?

Ceviche; tamal (steamed, stuffed cornmeal dough); and aji de gallina (chicken stew with rice).

How was the service?

Efficient and friendly, if you have any questions, they're happy to chat. You place your order and wait for it to be

Was the food nice?

The ceviche is made using tilapia, a firm freshwater fish, that has been cubed and briefly marinated in "leche de tigre", a creamy blend of lime, onion, coriander, ginger, garlic, salt, pepper, red chilli and celery, with a little bit of fish. It is delicious-

ly fresh, and a generous portion served with plantain chips and boiled sweet potatoes. The tamal (which may have originated in Mexico as tamalli means 'wrapped"), is a dough made from cornmeal that has been stuffed with small pieces of sautéed pork, onion and garlic and steamed in a banana leaf. The banana leaf has been removed before serving. It is a thick dough, designed to fill you up for the day. For the stew, pulled chicken mixed in a creamy sauce is served with rice. The sauce, which has crushed pecan nuts, is almost the texture of korma, with a light flavour of Parmesan coming through.

What about the packaging?

All packaging is recyclable – brown cardboard boxes and paper bags.

What did it cost?

€34.50 for lunch for three people – ceviche, €12.50; tamal, €9.50; aji de gallina, €12.50.

Where does it deliver?

There is no delivery. Chilli Pepper operates exclusively at the Merrion Square Market every Thursday from noon to 2.30pm.

Would I order it again?

Yes. The ceviche is delicious at lunchtime on a sunny day.









Nutritious and easy to cook asparagus dishes

Although often overlooked, asparagus has a subtle and delicious flavour



Asparagus is such a versatile

ingredient, often overlooked, and cooked as part of a side dish or as a small part of a main dish. It is one of my favourite ingredients. It's also incredibly nutritious and so easy to cook.

As the asparagus season is short, you are likely to see it feature a lot on restaurant menus at the same time. It works well as a dish on its own, but also with meat, fish, and other vegetables, as an accompaniment.

White asparagus usually comes into season just before green asparagus, and as it is usually a little bit thicker and woodier at the bottom, it needs to be trimmed a bit more and cooked for a bit longer than green asparagus.

Asparagus can be cooked in so many different ways and every chef has their own favourite technique. One of my preferred ways to use asparagus is to salt

the spears in 10 per cent salt, and vacuum seal them overnight. This allows osmosis to occur which draws out the water from the asparagus and allows the salt to internally season and soften the asparagus. After I remove it from the bag, I fry it in a little butter, garlic and lemon and serve it with pretty much any main course.

I find that white asparagus is similar to endive in flavour profile, in that the slight bitterness benefits from being cooked in a sweet liquid or dressing.

These are three of my favourite asparagus recipes, to highlight the vegetable's subtle and delicious flavour. Asparagus, ham and egg is a classic pairing, enhanced by the crispy Gruyère which brings an umami flavour.

Risotto is one of the best ways to eat green veg, especially asparagus. It's a great way to clear out the fridge and have a delicious, filling meal at the same time. You can add some chicken or fish to make it a more substantial meal. You could also make a pea purée to mix in to make it super green and vibrant.

Polenta is one of my favourite bases. I see it as a carrier for cheese and butter, super soft and bursting with flavour. The asparagus compliments it beautifully and really shines as the star of the dish.



Grilled asparagus with poached egg, smoked ham and Gruyère cheese crisp

Serves: 2

Ingredients:

300g asparagus 1 tbsp olive oil Salt and pepper 2 eggs 100g smoked ham 150g Gruyère cheese 15g plain flour

Method

1. Preheat your grill to medium heat. Wash the asparagus and trim off the woody ends. Toss the asparagus in the olive oil, salt and pepper. Grill the asparagus for eight minutes, turning occasionally, until tender and lightly charred. 2. While the asparagus is cooking, prepare the poached eggs. Bring a pot of water to a simmer and crack the eggs into separate ramekins or bowls. Once the water is simmering, create a gentle whirlpool in the pot with a spoon and carefully slide the eggs into the water. Cook for three minutes until the whites are set and the yolks are still runny. Remove the eggs with a slotted spoon and set aside on a clean paper

3. To make the Gruyère cheese

crisp, preheat your oven to 190 degrees. Mix the Gruyère and flour together in a bowl. Line a baking tray with baking paper and spread the cheese and flour mix on to it. Bake for six minutes until the cheese has melted and is golden brown. Remove from the oven and allow to cool for a minute. 4. To serve, spoon the asparagus on to a plate. Top the asparagus with the smoked ham, poached egg and salt and pepper. Break up the Gruyère cheese crisp and place on top of the egg. Season with a little more salt and pepper.

Asparagus and pea risotto with toasted hazelnuts and bonito vinegar dressing

Serves: 2

Ingredients:

100g hazelnuts
250g asparagus
1tbs olive oil
1 onion, diced
2 garlic cloves, crushed
200g arborio rice
50ml white wine
1 litre veg stock
2tbs butter
50g cream cheese
50g grated Parmesan,
plus extra for garnish
2tbs fresh peas
1tbs bonito vinegar
Salt and pepper

Method

1. Preheat the oven to 180 degrees. Spread the hazelnuts on a baking tray and roast for 10 minutes until they are lightly golden brown. Remove from the oven and set aside to cool. Once cooled, roughly chop the hazelnuts and set aside.

2. Span off the woody.

2. Snap off the woody ends of the asparagus and discard. Cut the remaining asparagus spears into 3cm pieces. 3. Heat the olive oil in a large saucepan over medium heat. Add the onion and garlic and cook for five minutes until soft and translucent. Add the arborio rice to the saucepan and stir. Add the white wine and reduce by half. Add a ladle full of vegetable stock and stir until the liquid has been absorbed by the rice. Continue adding the vegetable stock, one spoonful at a time, and stirring continuously until the rice is cooked through and has a creamy texture. This should take about 20-25 minutes. 4. Add the butter, cream

cheese and grated
Parmesan. Stir in the peas
and asparagus and cook
for three minutes, until
the vegetables are
tender. Remove the
risotto from the heat and
season with salt and
pepper to taste. Spoon
into a bowl and grate the
remaining Parmesan on
top. Garnish with the
toasted hazelnuts and a
dash of bonito vinegar.

Pan-fried asparagus with soft polenta and garlic and pine nut gremolata

Serves: 2

Ingredients:

150g fine polenta 250ml water 80ml milk 50g cream cheese 70g grated Parmesan 2tbs butter 1 lemon, zested and juiced 2 cloves of garlic, minced

30g pine nuts 1tbs chopped parsley, plus extra to garnish 250g asparagus

1tbs olive oil
Salt and pepper

Method

1. Start by making the soft polenta. In a medium-sized saucepan, bring the water to a boil. Reduce the heat to low, then slowly add the polenta, whisking constantly. Cook out for five minutes, stirring occasionally, until the polenta is smooth and creamy. Add in the milk,



cream cheese, grated Parmesan, butter, lemon juice, salt and pepper. **2.** While the polenta is

cooking, prepare the garlic and pine nut gremolata. Finely chop the garlic cloves and toast the pine nuts in a dry frying pan until golden brown. Mix the garlic and pine nuts together in a bowl. Add the chopped parsley and lemon zest.

3. Snap off the woody ends of the asparagus and discard.

Heat the olive oil in a large frying pan over medium-high heat. Add the asparagus and cook for five minutes, stirring occasionally, until the asparagus is tender and lightly charred.

4. To serve, spoon the soft polenta on to a plate and top with the pan-fried asparagus. Sprinkle the garlic and pine nut gremolata over the asparagus, then garnish with parsley leaves. Season with salt and pepper.

A family favourite

Lentils provide great texture, fibre and protein

I always try to include as many

nourishing ingredients as possible in recipes. For this one, I'm combining one of my favourite legumes with traditional spaghetti and meatballs. Here, lentils provide great texture, fibre and protein, along with the meatballs. They also lighten them and are quite undetectable by picky younger eaters once cooked. Of course, you can use your own cooked lentils but I've used tinned ones for convenience. Choose Puy, brown or black lentils.

The red wine adds warmth and a subtle sweetness. I regularly add leftover wine to different sauces, gravy and marinades for a great depth of flavour. Cooking it out gets rid of the alcohol. Whiskey and brandy are also fantastic for meat marinades and sauces such as creamy mushroom sauce or peppercorn sauce. I also regularly add a splash of gin or sambuca when steaming fish.

Using flavoured sausages here is a great shortcut to flavour. No need to crush garlic and rifle through your herb drawer when you use Italian, garlic and herb or Mediterranean sausages.

There are so many great Irish artisan sausage makers such as O'Flynns in Cork, James Whelan butchers (nationwide) or Dublin-based Higgins butchers (no relation!). I always have a few packets of Italian sausages in the freezer for Bolognese and meatballs.

I love the texture of linguine and choose it over regular spaghetti as the sauce clings to the flat surface easier.


Lilly's kitchen tips

Freeze any leftover wine whenever you have it. Due to its alcohol content, it doesn't freeze solid and, instead, it freezes like a granita and is easy to scoop out with a spoon. Perfect for gravy and sauces.

Wetyour hands when rolling any form of

meatball or falafel. It ensures the mix doesn't get sticky and gives a smooth surface. Keep a little of the pasta water, as you may

need it to loosen up the sauce if it reduces too much. Just keep the salt content in mind and season carefully.



Lentil and pork meatballs

Serves: 4

Ingredients:

1x tin lentils (240g drained) 540g sausages (use flavoured sausages such as Italian, garlic and herb, or Mediterranean) Olive oil

1 small onion, finely diced 100ml red wine

1x 400g tin chopped tomatoes, blitzed till smooth

500g tomato passata 1 tsp dried Italian herbs or oregano

500g linguine

To serve: grated Parmesan

Method

1. Drain the lentils well and

mash them in a large bowl. Use a potato masher or a wooden spoon to crush the lentils. You don't want to create a smooth puree here so keep some texture.

2. Using a sharp knife, slit down each sausage and remove the meat from the casings. Add the meat to the lentils and mix to combine. Use a tablespoon to portion the mix into 16-20 meatballs, using wet hands to shape. Heat two tablespoons of olive oil in a wide frying pan. Brown the meatballs for three to four minutes, then turn and cook for a further four minutes, till lightly golden

3. Heat one tablespoon of olive oil in a wide pan. Saute the chopped onion till soft, add the wine and leave to simmer and the alcohol to burn off. Add the pureed tomato, passata and herbs. Bring to a simmer and add the meatballs. Leave to simmer on low for 15 minutes with the lid on.

4. Cook the pasta in plenty of salted water for 10 minutes until al dente. Drain, reserving some of the cooking water in the pot (see tips).

5. Divide the pasta and meatballs between serving bowls, serve with a drizzle of olive oil, black pepper and Parmesan

Smokey and salty

This is excellent with grilled meats, baked potatoes and steamed vegetables

What is it? Achill Island Smoked Sea Salt (RRP €4.50, 75g).

What's good about it? It is hot smoked in-house, over beech and oak wood chips, giving a natural rather than artificial smoked taste to the crunchy flakes.

Who makes it? It is made by the O'Malley family on Achill Island, Co Mayo, where mum Marjorie is the managing director, dad Kieran is the salt maker and manager of production and operations, and daughter Maebh is sales and marketing manager. They make their salt by hand, in a process that began in their kitchen in 2013 and moved to a customised production facility three years later.

How do luse it? Anywhere you want a salty taste, along with a bit of smokiness.



It is excellent sprinkled on grilled meats, baked potatoes, steamed vegetables, and especially good with eggs. On the compa-

ny's website, achillislandseasalt.ie, you'll find a selection of recipes including one for an intriguing roast parsnip hummus with smoked sea salt.

Where can I buy it? It is widely available from delis and specialist food stores and online from chillislandseasalt.ie.

Anything else? Nigella Lawson is reputed to carry a mini tin of Maldon salt in her handbag, and you can do the same with Achill Island sea salt, which has very cute tiny tins on sale online and at the visitor centre gift shop at the production facility on Achill. The gift shop is due to reopen for the summer season in June. As well as the natural and smoked salt, the range also includes sea salt with Atlantic Wakame seaweed from Connemara.

Irish whiskey galore

Whiskey Live Dublin is a great chance to get to grips with the bamboozling breadth of choice

Are you bewildered by the constant issue of new Irish whiskeys? Barely a week goes past without a new release from one of the distillers, sometimes featuring a finish in some sort of wine cask, made from different mashes, or given smoky

flavours from peat. A lot of them are very expensive, too.

If you want to have whiskey explained and to discover the difference between a pot still and single malt whiskey (or whisky, if not Irish) it might be worth paying a visit to Whiskey Live Dublin. This will take place in the RDS, in Dublin 4, on Friday and Saturday, May 19th and 20th.

There are two sessions each day.

Tickets are €44 excluding booking fee, and can be booked at whiskeylivedublin.com and universe.com. Masterclasses cost €10 (excluding booking fee) each and should be purchased before the day. As well as tastings, topics will include whiskey cocktails and food pairings.

The Teeling 15-year-old featured here has been aged for 14 years in former bourbon casks followed by 12 months in former sauvignon casks. One of a series of limited releases from Bushmills, the Pomerol Causeway Collection was aged in bourbon and oloroso sherry casks before being finished in barrels used to age Pomerol wine in Bordeaux.

The Celtic Cask series are limited release whiskeys aged for Celtic Whiskey Shop on Dawson Street. This single cask release, Daichead a Trí, was aged for its final year in PX sherry casks. As Gaeilgeoirí will know, this is the 43rd release. Just 199 bottles were produced.

Powerful and smooth with layers of vanilla spice and dried fruits.







Where does the best carvery in Ireland? I'll find it, even if it kills me

For years I've laboured under the assumption that those marrowfat peas that require overnight soakage had gone the way of the dodo. The Saturday night ritual of dumping the whole bag into some water with their little Solpadeine disc of bicarbonate of soda gave way to many Sunday childhood servings of mushy peas along with the roast dinner. Imagine my surprise then when I discovered that while mushy pea technology has evolved to include "no-soak" and tinned varieties, there are still bags complete with bicarb tablets available in supermarkets for those who want to indulge.

I was told recently that mushy peas have "no place" in a carvery dinner. People have emphatic views about carvery dinners, and I had better get used to those views as I've recently embarked on a labour of love: a podcast series about Sunday roasts which I'm co-hosting with my friend and fellow beef joint enthusiast Esther O'Moore Donohue.

It used to be that handing out business cards was the appropriate way to network and socialise. Then it was email addresses and social media handles. Now it's "do you have a podcast?" and a polite promise to subscribe no matter the worryingly niche subject matter. My niche subject matter is the pub Sunday roast, and the intended audience is anyone with a deep appreciation of a roast potato, who gets a contact high from the steamy glass of a carvery bain-marie.

As a fat woman I've had to come to terms with the cognitive struggle of being public about consuming and enjoying food. My instinct is to make myself smaller and hide away and not remind people that I, like everyone else, need calories to survive. We're only ever one or two news cycles away from discourse around the "obesity epidemic" or whether or not it's okay for Taylor Swift to use the word "fat" in a negative context in a music video. "It's okay for Taylor to say it," the think pieces go, "because she's suf $fered\,from\,an\,eating\,disorder."\,Fat\,people\,suffer$ from eating disorders too while being constantly reminded that their peers in the relentless battle with food are free to acknowledge that being fat is the absolute worst thing imaginable.

I was fresh out of two months in inpatient eating disorder treatment when Esther and I sowed the seeds of the podcast. We waited patiently through the pandemic for pubs and restaurants to open, and I fought against the constantly tormenting voices in my head that tell me to

either eat everything or nothing. The carvery dinners around Dublin we've been sampling for the podcast have been helpful in putting some structure on my meals for that day.

I've been determined not to let any diet culture chat leak into our in-depth investigations on the perfect shape for a boiled carrot – disc or baton – or the ranking of potato styles in order of importance on the plate – Esther is a roast girl for life, while I would argue that mash and roasties share top billing.

I've discovered that stuffing is important to me in a roast dinner, possibly as a result of my mother's proficiency in both a wet and a dry stuffing. The wet is a stunning meat loaf-esque concoction involving Superquinn sausage meat, while the dry is a breadcrumbs-and-Paxo number involving HP Brown Sauce and just enough melted butter to ensure that it isn't all that dry after all.

Of all the roasts we've sampled so far, only one

had mushy peas as an option, and two offered Yorkshire puddings. Cabbage seems ubiquitous, while chips as a cheeky side are not unusual. Mass-produced roast potatoes tend to have a lot of give in the outer shell. We've yet to come across a truly crispy one. We plan to sample ten roasts in all, with episodes bringing us right up to Christmas Day. Dublin carvery venues like The Yacht in Clontarf and The Morgue in Templeogue are on our list, and we're hoping to venture out to The Poitín Stil in Rathcoole and The Coachmans by the airport. With any luck, our tens of listeners will balloon enough to allow us to bring our show on the road to sample the roasts of Ireland.

Everyone I've spoken to so far about my carvery journey has lit up in the face at the opportunity to wax lyrical about meat and two veg. There's obviously a national conversation bubbling underneath the surface as we all strive to load the perfect fork, accompanied by the one true acceptable carvery drink: a pint of Miwadi, or as the Scots call it, "dilutin' juice".

The UK has a restaurant chain dedicated to roasts with more than 150 Toby Carverys across England, Wales and Scotland. God willing Esther and I will have the chance to take the podcast international, and see if a dedicated carvery joint raises the stakes too high. They'd want to be some fairly crispy roast potatoes.

Twitter has a consistent ability to reveal people at their absolute worst



This is a facetious hypothetical.

Deliberately so. I don't want my Twitter timeline filled with people giving out to me. Let's say a gameshow host is asked what they think about daylight saving. The answer consists of 10 sentences, uttered in a moderate tone of voice. These sentences can be full of nuance, or they can be ill-thought-out tripe; that doesn't matter. What matters is that their opinion will be boiled down to a headline: "Furious gameshow host slams clocks going backwards.'

A link to the story will be posted on Twitter, and seconds later people will start reacting to it. In many cases, they won't be reacting to the original 10 sentences, but to the headline. In many cases, they will be people who have been arguing about daylight saving for many years, in the course of which they have been subject to all sorts of vile abuse: even threats of physical harm, rape or death. For them, it's not just about the issue, but how the other side conduct themselves. Those in favour of dumping daylight saving will regard the gameshow host as defending them against the invective they have endured; those who want to retain it will now see the gameshow host as having endorsed the use of threats.

The bewildered gameshow host's timeline will fill up with praise from some and condemnation from others. It may well include abuse and threats

But that's Twitter. It's designed to promote gut reactions in the shortest number of characters

The gameshow host has the choice of deleting their Twitter account (generating more headlines) or embarking on the protracted process of reporting the abusive tweets. None of this will have changed their mind about the issue of daylight saving: more likely, it will bring them to regret ever having said anything about it in the first place. From expressing what they thought was a reasonable opinion, they are now being depicted as someone who supports rape.

But that's Twitter. It's designed to promote gut reactions in the shortest number of characters. Every issue, no matter how complex, is boiled down to a series of competing declarations and the near-irresistible lure of turning any debate into a screaming match. I've been on Twitter for 13 years and I've always found it to be like that.

In fairness, not just that: Twitter can also be funny and friendly and informative. It can be a place of kindness, and there are many accounts genuinely aimed at making their part of the world a better place. People will have different experiences. For me, it's professionally useful.

It's just the sales pitch of Twitter being a benign digital town square: a bit like ancient Athens, with philosophers gathering to interrogate the nature of existence; Twitter was never like that, and to give my hot take, never will be like that.

When Elon Musk finally took over the company, American Twitter had a largely predictable range of reactions: people on the left threatening to leave, others arguing that they should stay and fight. Supporters of Musk were of course delighted. But not because they had thrown off the shackles of Big Brother censorship: not withstanding some of the high-profile examples, Twitter's "moderation" has always been extremely light touch. Their delight stemmed from the fact that this would wind up liberals. And in that, they have a far better understanding of how political "debate" on Twitter works. The aim isn't to change hearts and minds, but simply to antagonise the enemy. It's a football match, with the competing supporters chanting at each other.

I could be wrong. It's possible that the richest man in the world will come up with an algorithm to transform Twitter into a place that fosters mutual respect. But what he can't change is human nature. The most disturbing aspect of Twitter has been its consistent ability to reveal people at their absolute worst: craven, spiteful, festering in hate. It's only off-line that you can try to fix that.

I'm there, "We are not playing any more rugby matches until I think we've got a chance of winning one."

A voice suddenly pipes up: "Er, I thought that rugby was supposed to be, like, fun?"

I'm like, "Who said that?"
"I did," a girl goes, putting her hand up

- no shame at all.

I'm like, "Get lost. Right now. I don't want you here – not with that attitude."

Off she goes, which is a genuine shame, because she was our best player against Newpork – the only decent one we had, in fact. But I'm laying down a definite, definite morker here.

I'm there, "If you want to play for this school, you will do things my way," and as I'm talking, I stort handing out the exercise and diet sheets that I paid Honor five hundred snots to type up and print out.

The Ukrainian drummer playing gigs around Ireland

When Mark Kosinsky was just one year old he became a refugee when his family lost their home during the war in Donbas

Nine-year-old drummer Mark

Kosinsky is from Berdyansk in south-eastern Ukraine. From the age of two or three, he started drumming with whatever he could get his hands on; bowls, tables, cups, spoons and even cans of baby food became his instruments. "I don't know why I started drumming," says Mark, whose father Dmitry is a professional musician and music teacher. "I just started with a bowl and paintbrushes, and drummed on it."

From the time Mark was five, during the summer months, his dad would load the drums into the car and Mark would busk on the streets of the city of Berdyansk. "I would play with backing tracks and people would put money into the bag," he says. Through busking and playing shows in Ukraine, he was able to buy himself two drum kits and continue learning his craft.

Mark and his family immediately fled Ukraine in late February as the war erupted. With his mother, father, two sisters, and his brother, he travelled by car from Ukraine to Slovakia, followed by Poland. This was not the family's first experience of displacement. When Mark was one year old, he became a refugee for

the first time when his family lost their home in the Donetsk region during the war in Donbas.

His parents made the decision to travel to Ireland from France by ferry after a stay in a church in Germany. They slept in hotels, on mattresses, and with strangers on their long journey, before landing in Ireland in March. "We come to this hotel in Co Cavan and people give to us a room with three single beds and one double bed," Mark says. "When we started to live here, the food was delicious because often it was fries. I feel good here."

Mark and his family lived in the hotel in Virginia for five months. As the family took only clothes and money with them as they fled, Mark had to leave his drum kits behind in Ukraine, but he didn't stop drumming, using anything to tap out a rhythm, even the edge of the bed in his friend's bedroom. He was gifted a small electronic drum kit while living in the hotel, and more recently, a fundraiser helped Mark's parents to buy another small acoustic drum kit, which he is building up with the right equipment. He has also started lessons with a drum teacher.

His favourite song to practise at the moment is the 1980s classic. Never

Gonna Give You Up, by Rick Astley. Since arriving in Ireland, Mark has played drum solos at the Liberties Festival in Dublin, the Letterkenny Blues and Roots Festival, and other festivals and events in Sligo and Mullingar. He has his own YouTube channel, is learning to play the bass, and says he would love to be part of a punk or pop band when he is older.

The family have lived in a house in Monaghan since August, and are expecting a new baby in December. They are happy in Ireland, they say, and hope to stay, as they no longer have a home in Ukraine. They see a future here.



I felt-like a lot of the guys wanted to have aggressive sex or for you to be submissive,"

But then when you talk to them, you realise that they don't want that, they just want to have loving sex

It was really eye opening to see that they actually didn't want to be like the guys in porn.

Children are accessing porn online as young as eight, but it's a subject largely ignored in Irish schools. A pioneering transition year programme is encouraging students to talk about the impact of porn on their lives, relationships and sexual expectations

n Eoghan Cleary's wellbeing class in Temple Carrig School in Greystones, a group of transition year students are writing up the sexual expectations they think society has for their own gender. This is part of the Let's Get Real Programme on media, popular culture and pornography, devised by the Dublin Rape Crisis Centre.

Earlier Cleary showed them four television ads for perfume and fast food, to demonstrate how the wider culture is bombarding them with gendered and sexualised imagery from a young age. (He asks them: "What is the ad showing? What is the ad selling? What is the ad teaching men? What is the ad teaching women? How does this ad make me feel?"

"Targeted and self-conscious," says one girl to the latter question.)

It's early on in the process so the students are still a bit shy, but that changes as the course progresses.

"What is expected of your gender?" he asks one group of teenage boys.

"I think dominance," says one boy, speaking for the group.

"How do you feel you're expected to show dominance?"

He looks down at the page. "We've written: Aggressive. Strong. Muscular and in control. Taking charge and making decisions."

When the girls' group is asked what they think is expected of their gender, a girl reads: "Be innocent and submissive but know what you're doing at the same time."

Another girl says, "Be hairless from the head down." There's a lot about body image.

Amid the sexual expectations, the words "slapping" and "choking" appear. As does a quote, apparently from controversial social media personality Andrew Tate: "Slap, slap, shut-up

• bitch."

"Four years ago, 'choking' didn't come up," Cleary tells me later, "But now it comes up in every single class.'

All of the suggestions come from the students. Cleary is very careful not to bring in anything that they don't introduce themselves

After a while he says: "Are your parents the ones teaching you these things? Are teachers teaching you these things?"

They shake their heads. "Where's it coming from?"

Several voices say: "Porn."

Cleary is officially an English teacher.

Five years ago in class, some of the boys espoused some misogynistic ideas and the girls began "actively responding to and rejecting those ideas. It was providing great debate in my English class but was also giving an insight into Whoever's got a smart phone is going to watch it....
It's free and it's literally everywhere

embedded beliefs that some of the guys had that were just totally not based in reality."

He started a gender studies class as part of the TY wellbeing course. In the context of some of the attitudes he encountered, he asked, like today:

"Who's teaching you this?" There was a long silence. Eventually someone said, "It's porn, sir." Cleary sighs. "They gauged my response so closely and when they realised they could talk about it, that's all we did for the rest of the class.

At around the same time, he got a disclosure from a student about a sexual assault. He engaged all the support he could for her. At one point he asked her what else she'd like him to do. "And she said, crying, 'Just teach us about it - this is happening to more people than me... Nobody's teaching that it isn't appropri-

He began to focus more in the class on consent, pornography and media literacy. Subsequently he got in touch with the Dublin Rape Crisis Centre and learned that it was working on the same things. The school now uses its BodyRight programme to teach consent and awareness of sexual violence to third years (within the SPHE hours), and its Let's Get Real programme to discuss media literacy and pornography with TY students. Parents are supportive, he says. "I send something home at the beginning of every year with a list of the topics that we're going to cover, so that if parents want to know what their child is discussing in school that week, they can continue the conversation at home.'

He has no strong opinions about porn use for adults. For him, this is about children and teenagers seeing things for which they have no safe context. He feels that most kids have been abandoned to their always-on smartphones and that

adults, largely through ignorance, haven't been giving them the guidance that they need. He has invited me to Temple Carrig to see what they do, and to talk to some students who've previously done these courses.

Firstly, I meet a group of teenage boys from fifth year who've taken both the Let's Get Real and BodyRight courses, and are happy to talk about it.

How did they feel about doing this course at the start? They laugh. "At first I was a bit uncomfortable," says a boy named Neil.

"I remember you in class... 'Why do we have to do this?'," says Eoghan Cleary.

"But hearing other people in the class talk about this stuff made me feel like it's all right to talk about this stuff," says Neil.

> Did they ever talk about these things with each other?

We might have joked about it," says Jordan. 'You didn't

delve into it too much." "You get

slagged about it if you watch [porn], but you get slagged if you don't watch it as well," says Cillian. "But I didn't

understand that nearly all my friends had watched porn for pleasure... Before that you thought it was just you.'

When did they first see something inappropriate on the internet?

"I was quite young," says Neil. "I was seven or eight and it was quite upsetting. I was at a friend's house and I was shown it. And I remember we got in trouble. It made me think: 'this is really bad' and I couldn't stop thinking of it. It created this fear."

The first time I saw it we got given out to too, but I just didn't understand it," says Liam, "I was just over at a friend's house and he showed me this picture. And you saw it and thought that's weird. I'm not touching that. It seemed so wrong to me. I was about nine."

Did parents or teachers ever talk to them about this sort of thing before? "Sex education," says Neil, "was a bit more straightforward. 'This is sex. This is what happens with sex. Porn is bad'. But in Mr Cleary's class we actually got to look into it. We actually got to go 'Oh, this is how porn affects your mind'.'

What was different about this? "It was a conversation," says Jordan. "And it was about the experience of sharing stuff. So it wasn't just about getting the information

Did they feel a sense of relief that it was being discussed?

Everyone nods vigorously. "100 per cent," says Jordan.

"In the class Mr Cleary made it feel like a safe space," says Cillian. "He set rules at the start of the class and it really made me feel like what was said in the classroom didn't leave it. When you're talking about something so seriously, you start enjoying

"We could trust Mr Cleary," says Neil. "We feel free to talk about stuff around Mr Cleary and not feel like he's judging us. It was nice to have that."

Was it important that it was a mixed group with boys and girls?

"Definitely," says Jordan. "Having an open discussion with both genders really made it feel more shared.'

"Hearing some of the stories that the girls were telling about being catcalled and stuff," says Neil. "I'd seen catcalling happening and I didn't think it was a big deal but hearing how they felt was an eye-opener for me. I didn't understand that girls felt that uncomfortable in those scenarios... And it really opened up my mind to think about it.'

Do they think the messaging that they were getting from social media and pornography could affect how they saw girls and women?

"Definitely," says Cillian.

"Pornography could easily reinforce a really unrealistic standard," says Jordan.

You wouldn't really consider how it affects your thinking before," says Liam. 'Some things are obviously very blatant, but most of it is sort of subconscious. You don't think wait a minute, this could affect me. And that could have an impact on a girl watching this as well."

What about people who worry that courses like this teach you about the existence of pornography?

"It's pretty hard to avoid," says Neil.

You're always going to come across it," says Cillian. "Whoever's got a smartphone is going to watch it It's free and it's literally everywhere, so figuring out the right from wrong is really helpful."

'Not being taught about it, you aren't able to guard yourself from it, you're letting your brain get damaged," says Liam. "And then you're just going to grow up to be someone trying to fulfil that dominant, aggressive, unrealistic role. No one wants that.'

'And if it's not talked about, you feel alone, thinking it's just me," says Cillian.

How do they think pornography affected them? "Some of the content [I saw] made me question a lot of stuff about sex itself," says Liam. "How violent it seemed... It made me not like the idea at

all and not want to be in a relationship." "It makes you nervous about going into

relationships," says Cillian. 'You're scared about what people will think if you've got something wrong," says Neil.

"Did that change for you?" asks Eoghan Cleary

"Definitely," says Liam. "[Sex can] have meaning when there's thought and emo-

tion behind it When you see that content on your phone, it doesn't tell you this is a loving relationship. It doesn't seem like an expression of love; it tells you that it's violence."

Do you think these courses have had an impact on their relationships or future relationships?

"Before this I was really worried about getting into any sort of relationship, because I knew that there should be boundaries but I wasn't sure what they were," says Jordan.

"The sexual boundary thing [on the Bodyright course] that we did with Mr Cleary, that was one of the most helpful things we learned," says Neil. "I was really scared about all that stuff. I was really worried that when the time came, that I wouldn't know how to do it, how to get consent and how to be respectful. It was really good to learn there's a proper way and to hear girls in the classroom say, 'That's fine' was a reassurance.'

'I've been able to recognise when I feel uncomfortable," says Liam. "And I know that I don't have to do something just because they want to. Recognising that there's some stuff you don't have to go along with even though it's made out that you should. Some stuff just isn't okay. And you're able to say that and bring it up.'

"It keeps people safe," says Cillian. "You can talk to the opposite person much better and it's safer for everyone."

Based on a survey which staff of Temple

Carrig undertook at the school, more than 50 per cent of the student body regularly used porn. A quarter of the male students accessed it more than once a day. Five years ago, surveys suggested that children were first encountering pornographic images online at about 11 or 12. Newer surveys suggest that that's dropped to as young as eight. Young people look at porn for pleasure, but also for education. Many of the girls look at porn to learn

what they think is expected of them. Whether a student has ever actively sought out porn or not, it will likely have been sent to them on social media, and it will certainly be affecting the expectations of other young people around them. "It impacts

on their lives as soon as they start having sexual interactions with people," says Cleary. He thinks that many Irish adults are in

denial about what this means. Sex and pornography are usually dealt with by a handful of lessons given by teachers or parents spaced out over years. But as soon as children get a smartphone, they can access inappropriate content every single day.

It's not enough to tell them that what they see in porn "isn't real", says Cleary. "They know it's not real, but they don't

have an alternative. It's still what they rely on to decide what's expected of them What kids are taught about sex in school is how to do it.

"But from the end of primary school they know how to do it We aren't teaching relationships and sexual education at the level that is relevant to the students, [and] children are filling that gap with the porn industry.'

Cleary thinks courses like these should be embedded in the curriculum, and not left to the discretion of individual teachers and principals who then need to fight for space on a competitive timetable.

Caitríona Freir from the Dublin Rape Crisis Centre agrees. "Teachers frequently report a desire to do the [BodyRight and Let's Get Real] trainings. However, they have difficulty getting cover for their classes. If [these classes] were recognised by the Department of Education, substitution cover would be provided for the teachers. Furthermore, if BodyRight and Let's Get Real were included in the SPHE/RSE curriculum, we could ensure that all students were receiving relevant, standardised, evidence-based information."

There are consequences to not taking this seriously. Every year, Cleary and his colleagues get disclosures from students about upsetting sexual experiences that sometimes constitute sexual assault. "We get between two and four a year that need external support, whether it be counselling or even Tusla or the guards.'

He can sometimes see a student realising, during these classes, that something they experienced wasn't right. "They'll remember something that they haven't ever thought about before or realise that what they're currently experiencing isn't healthy and they'll come and ask for support...I'm

thinking of one girl in particular who was in a relationship that was not healthy. [She] sought our help and ended the relationship. I don't think she would have realised otherwise, because there was just no space for her to reflect on it.'

And he wants to stress that boys are also vulnerable. "We've also had examples of guys coming [to us] upset having had sex with somebody over the weekend when they didn't want to, but not feeling like they had the vocabulary to discuss it with the person."

A small group of fifth year girls who've done both the BodyRight and Let's Get Real modules join us in the library. They're smart and funny and eager to talk.

What guidance did they get about pornography before? "Don't watch it!" savs Emma. "It would have been kind of negative. But in this class, we wanted to stay after the bell and keep talking and have discussions. When we came out. everyone had a completely different mindset on porn and everything else than we did when we first went in.'

"I think that they probably just thought that if they don't talk about [porn], we wouldn't really know about it," says Anna.

And what sort of sex education did they get? "It was always very biological," says Maya. "It wasn't about relationships or any of that."

Did they talk to each other about pornography? "I don't think girls really talked about it that much," says Emma. "If it was brought up in a conversation with girls in maybe second or third year, everyone would get really awkward and say, 'I don't know what that is'."

"We'd talk about it now," says Anna. Is it accurate to say their generation gets most of their information about sex from porn?

Everyone says "yeah" together. "Or we've heard rumours from years ahead," says Emma.

Do they remember the first time they saw something pornographic online?

"Pop-up ads," says Emma.

"They're the worst," says Gemma. "Obviously you shouldn't go on illegal websites but if you're trying to watch episodes of a show that isn't on Netflix, [you'd] see: 'Elena is two kilometres away' That was definitely the first time that I ever

> was exposed to something like that. I was really. really young. I was just like What the hell is this?' I was probably around six or seven. I was so confused about why anyone would want to see that."

"When I first got an iPad, I think I was nine or 10, even the

legal games you used to get had ads with cartoons of simulated sex," says Iris. "And I had parental controls on my iPad.

How did it affect you? "Mostly I didn't want my parents to see it," says Iris. "Because I didn't want them to delete the app."

"I was obsessed with the Harry Potter movies," says Emma. "So I looked up the cast. I was looking at Daniel Radcliffe. And then something popped up: 'See Daniel Radcliffe naked'. Later that day, my mum and dad were like, we need to have a chat because we found naked pictures of Daniel

They all laugh. "I had my iPad confiscattwo years ago.

Did they think about how pornography

was affecting their lives before these courses?

"I was always really scared because I thought that because guys are watching it, even though you're on the same level of experience, they're still in a more experienced position," says Iris. "But you don't want to put yourself in a position where you're watching porn that you don't want to watch, just to see what to expect. It's always about sexualising women."

"How did that make you feel about what sex might be like?" asks Eoghan Cleary.

"Terrifying," says Iris.

"It kind of makes you feel like you're only there for the man," says Maya, "like you have to be submissive and you have to take everything. It kind of makes it scary,

because maybe you don't want to be hit or whatever it is. It makes sex quite scary for women. I don't want that. I don't want to be just for a man.'

How did the courses help free them from those expectations? "Hearing the boys' voices was the biggest head-turner for me," says Emma. "I was just so sur prised. They were actually thinking similarly to how we were thinking. Before the class I thought guys just wanted to use girls for their bodies... And then coming out of the class, it's like, well guys think that they have to do all this stuff because girls want them to."

"Getting information directly from people your age, rather than getting the information from porn," says Gemma. "It was such a big difference.'

Would they like more classes like this? "Totally, because we'll be changed by sixth year again," says Emma. "A class where you can all talk about what you feel would be good."

"And I think it should be an ongoing thing throughout the year," says Gemma.

What could parents do better? "Maybe leave it longer before you give children technology," says Anna.

"I think make yourself open enough that your kid feels safe to come to you to tell them things," says Gemma, "instead of Emma getting in trouble for not even meaning to [download something]. You need to be open to listening to what they're saying. 'I saw this. I was scared' or whatev-

"Our parents were also brought up differently," says Emma. "My mum, even a mention of [porn] is like, 'How do you even know what that is?'

How did they feel about the classes? "It was like a pressure being lifted off bit by bit," says Emma, "With each class you come out feeling better.'

"It was very quiet at the start," says

Maya. "But then when you got into your groups, and you're talking about it more, people started opening up.'

"I think we all felt more confident in ourselves," says Anna.

Why is that? "In my head, before that course," says Emma, "I'd think guys were expecting girls to do everything in porn and expecting us to look like the girls in porn, whereas afterwards having heard

> boys' voices, you understand that that's not how they think." "I felt like a lot of the guys wanted to have aggressive sex or

for you to be submissive." says Maya. "But then when you talk to them, you realise that they don't want that, they just want to have loving sex. It was really eye opening to see that they actually didn't want to be like the guys in porn."

"It made me feel so much better that they were being taught about what we're scared of," says Gemma. "And that they can empathise and be understanding."

What else did they learn? "We now know how important it is to talk to your partner," says Maya

"That was one of the biggest points of the class. It's not weird to talk about what you would like to do and then listen to what your partner wants to do."

"If something was happening that I didn't like before that class, I'd probably be like, 'Don't say anything, because that's just going make the whole thing awkward," says Emma. She thinks for a moment. "Now I'd be more inclined to wait to lose my virginity to wait until you find the right person and know that it's going to be a nice experience."

"Some people think classes like this will encourage people to have sex," says Eoghan Cleary.

They laugh. "No one is going to listen to this and go 'Right Mum, I've just learned about sex and now I'm going to go out and have it," says Emma.

Is there anything else they'd like to add? "I feel a lot more comfortable around the guys in general," says Iris. "How I perceived them changed. And I think their perception of the girls changed as well. I think they're a lot more mindful of what they say and how they think. And that's made me personally feel a lot more comfortable around them - I think most girls or women will have had bad experiences with guys they know and I feel like personally, I'm a lot more comfortable around [these boys].'

"I think it was the best class that I had last year," says Emma.

"And that's being in TY where you're on trips every single day. You come out in a better mood, and you just come out feeling more confident and reassured about everything that you were so worried about before."

How to survive the winter cold

Base layers, lip balm, hot food and a good old jive: we asked people who work and play outdoors to share their top tips for getting through winter

t's that time of year again.
Look around, leaves are
brown, and the sky is a hazy
shade of winter, to quote one
polo-necked singing duo.
Yes it's winter, well almost.
Clothing can help us fight the
damp and cold, but the darkness is
another story. You might need an emotional flak jacket for that.

It can be hard to get through these months. What to wear, how to stay warm, even how to keep going when brighter days feel far away. We asked people whose outdoor work or passions – from fishing to gardening – make them winter experts for their survival tips.

Fisherman Jackie Bates

'Hot food on a cold day. It tastes better out of doors'

If your winter peeve is getting your Vejas scuffed on the school run, spare a thought for Jackie Bates. Fishing out of Kilmore Quay, Co Wexford, for over half a century, he knows winter. "The only time we take time off is if there are storms or strong winds. Other than that, we have to keep going. The boat has to be paid for, wind or no wind," says the 72-year-old.

"Nearly always during November, the weather starts to break," says Bates. On stints of seven to 10 days at sea, he and his crew fish around the clock. "You're towing your net for three hours, then the gear is hauled in, you see what catch is in it and throw it back out again." He guts his catch by hand with a knife, then it's washed, sorted, iced and boxed for landing. "Your hands are cold all the time, you won't keep your hands warm," he says. Daughter

Alison and stepson Jason sell his catch at markets in Greystones, Arklow, Bagnalstown, Bunclody and Tullamore.

How does he keep warm? "Layers of clothes and plenty of tea drank." His top tip for winter is to eat well. Most trawlers nominate one man to do the cooking. "You have your bacon and cabbage on a Monday, Tuesday chicken stew, Wednesday pork, Friday is always fish, and we have a Sunday roast.

"I'm telling you, you're looking forward to that. Hot food on a cold day. It tastes better out of doors, without a doubt. You wouldn't tell that to the wife though."

Camaraderie helps too. "The five men on the boat, each man looks after the other man as well. You are looking after yourself, but you are also looking after the next man, and that's very important."

Five decades at sea has made it plain to him that our climate is changing, he says. "I think there are more storms, and we seem to have more wind now. The wind blows up and it could come any time. It's unpredictable. The men on the deck are under more pressure. There are big seas coming in on them."

Lollipop lady Fiona Ryan

'I'm like an Eskimo. Sometimes all you can see are my eyes'

Fiona Ryan is lollipop lady at Glencullen National School in the Dublin Mountains. It's one of the highest villages in Ireland. "It's a different world up here in the winter. It's two degrees colder, it's much windier, the rain would absolutely nearly knock you over, but it's all part of the job," she says.

Hail, rain or snow, Ryan has reported for duty twice a day for 23 years. "There are snowy days where you find it difficult to get to work. I know the children and the parents have the same thing, but I have to

be there. If the school is open, I have to be there."

There is no such thing as bad weather, just bad clothing. "They have me geared up to the nines," she says of her employer, Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County Council. That's a full-length waterproof reflective coat, hat, gloves and waterproof trousers. "I'm like an Eskimo. I wear one of those cowls across my face. Sometimes all you can see are my eyes. I'm fairly well covered because I don't want to get the wind damage on my face, I've no intention of ending up with that."

Woolly socks, leather steel-toe boots and lip balm complete the look. "If you are well dressed, you won't get cold," she says.

"Driving rain and wind, that's the worst, because even trying to hold the lollipop, the wind can whip it out of your hand if you don't hold on to it really tight. The wind can actually push you back, you have to brace yourself just to stay still."

Her charges are a big motivator. "They are a great bunch of kids and they make my job so much easier." Summer can be a more melancholy time for her, in fact. "Sometimes it's very hard to say goodbye to them, because you have gotten to know them through those years. They are moving on to better things, but it's still hard to say goodbye."

Winter in the mountains has its rewards, though. "I love when it's frosty and cold, but nice and bright. I have a view of the Sugarloaf and those are beautiful mornings."

Sea swimmer June Curtin

'We have to work harder in winter time to mind our mental health'

Clare sea swimmer June Curtin doesn't let winter stop her. She is the founder of Snámhaí Sásta, a community of swimmers who swim at Spanish Point beach in





•• Co Clare seven days a week, 365 days a year.

"I hadn't swam in years until I lost my husband to suicide. I suppose I was suffering very badly myself with my own mental health. I was struggling with stress and anxiety and the aftermath of what happened," she says.

"I had tried all forms of exercise and one morning I said, maybe I'll try sea swimming. The only problem was, I couldn't swim. But at that stage it was sink or swim."

Getting into freezing cold water was like a lightbulb moment. "I had no time to think of anything, only the waves coming at me at that very moment. It was almost like I left my troubles on the shoreline, and I just felt so good," says Curtin. Three-and-a-half years later, she is still swimming.

The mother of two teens meets her tribe of swimmers at Spanish Point every day, not only to swim, but to maintain mental health and boost morale in her community.

Winter can be hard. "Even the most optimistic and happy-go-lucky among us can feel it a little harder in the winter time, so it's very important to surround yourself with the right people, where you can have a bit of a laugh and a bit of fun," says Curtin.

"We have to work harder in winter time to find more ways to mind our mental health, and I suppose sea swimming is a great way to do that. People come together in the morning and there is so much laughter."

Wear a hat when swimming in winter, she advises. Neoprene gloves and booties help, too. Dress quickly after your dip and use thin base layers, such as long-sleeve thermals, woolly socks and a dryrobe. Followers of her Snámhaí Sásta Instagram account will know that post-swim singalongs and maybe even some jiving help with the warm-up.

In December, Curtin will swim three times a day, at 9.15am, 1.15pm and 4.15pm. That's 63 swims in 21 days. She is raising funds for the Simon Community in the midwest. She raised more than €50,000 for the charity last year.

Some winter swims are easier than others. "A lovely winter morning is the sun on your back. Even though it's very cold, to have the sun on your back when you are in the water, that's beautiful."

ESB technician Dermot Cunningham

'Climbing poles, the wind could be cutting the head off you'

Dermot Cunningham is busiest when the weather is worst. In his 23 years as an ESB network technician, he's seen it all. Storm Ophelia was the last big weather event. "As soon as it was safe, we were on the road. Fallen trees broke poles and pulled down lines. You are anxious trying to get people back on [the network]. Livelihoods are affected as well," says Cunningham.

His work is all overhead. "You are up a ladder, climbing poles, the wind could be cutting the head off you," he says. He works in darkness too, lit by a head torch.

have Gore-Tex gear for when it's lashing rain. You are covered head to toe." A snood or open-face balaclava helps on the bitter cold days, as does lip balm.

"Usually you are in gangs of three or four lads together, everyone has the same objective. In a storm, everyone does that extra bit. There is a bit of camaraderie there." When doing physical work in harsh conditions in remote areas, sustenance is important for energy and concentration. Trucks are kitted out with gas burners. "I'll often bring in soup with me and put it in a little pot on the stove," he says.

The big snow of 2010 was particularly memorable. "There were five of six of us doing a job over here, not a million miles from our house," says the Roundwood resident. "The snow was falling and it was

the real sticky stuff. Our hands were freezing. We'd been out all day, we were all wet, and it just seemed to really get in on us. We came back to my house here and my wife, in fairness, made up a really big batch of soup and it did the job. I'll never forget it. It was the coldest day I ever spent in my life."

His top tip for cold weather is to keep moving and always keep a woolly hat in the van. "If your car breaks down, it's very important to keep warm."

Gardener Pauline Dowling

'If our feet get wet, that's the worst thing that can happen'

Pauline Dowling has spent a lifetime outdoors. Growing up on a farm in Co

Carlow, she returned to the county after years as head gardener in Dublin's St Stephen's Green. Dowling is now foreman at the 40-acre Altamont Gardens, which welcomes 10,000 visitors a year.

"It's much colder in Carlow, it's probably the coldest county in Ireland in winter and the warmest in summer," says Dowling.

"I don't mind the winter too much, until we get to January. Up to Christmas it's normally wet. I find January is the worst month, because we will probably get a bit of snow and it gets more difficult on the roads," she says.

She and her team are in thermal socks from now until February. "We find that if our feet get wet over the day, that's the worst thing that can happen," says Dowling. OPW-supplied "Jolly" boots are warm and comfortable over rough terrain. Fleeces and sweatshirts are part of her uniform, but she swears by an Aran knit over them on the really cold days—"it copes with the Irish weather better than anything else".

She rotates pairs of gardening gloves throughout the day as they get wet.

She's not one for make-up. On her face, "it's just Astral cream, sunblock and lip balm," she says.

She sees evidence of climate change. "We see the different storms, the high winds just coming up very quickly, that's very evident. Trees are falling – a tree can be healthy enough, but if there is any kind of moisture, sometimes the whole root plate can turn over. So it is very evident, and it is a challenge for us.


"We have always found autumn to be a calm, quieter time, but now with storms coming up from the Atlantic, it's getting very challenging. It's harder to go on to the land as well – you have to use lighter machinery so as not to do damage, that's definitely a big change."

Food is fuel when you work outdoors and she tries to eat well. "For breakfast, I'll have organic porridge with organic apples stewed through it. I'll make lentil and tomato soup for lunch with pulses and beans. I try to make sure it's organic and local. It helps with the immune system." She takes a Vitamin D supplement in winter.

From the winter solstice on December 21st, there is a shift. "We see the day moving on, even a few minutes more daylight every day is a help to us." And then there is spring to look forward to.

One of the first markers of the season is the snowdrop. Altamont Gardens has the largest snowdrop collection in Ireland, boasting 150 named varieties. St Brigid's Day, on February 1st, marks the beginning of Snowdrop Month at Altamont.

"I think the snowdrop, because it's so small and it survives a very cold winter, a very long winter, I think it's bringing the light out of the darkness," says Dowling. "For me, it is heralding spring."

A recent wheelchair user, James McGill has spent the past year rekindling his social life after lymphoma left him unable to walk. Here he lists Ireland's best accessible bars and restaurants

hoosing where to eat is among the joys of dining out, but what if that choice was taken away or restricted? What if where you wanted to dine was dictated by where you could do so comfortably? Welcome to life as a wheelchair user.

Three years ago, 36-year-old Dubliner James McGill had an active social life. A media strategist with Google, McGill worked hard and played hard. But all that changed when he had a couple of falls that resulted in him being admitted to Beaumont Hospital.

He was diagnosed with CNS (central nervous system) lymphoma, which had caused cancerous growths on the right side of his brain, with another on the frontal lobe, greatly impacting his mobility. He left Beaumont 10 months later, wheelchair in tow.

It's mind boggling...

Five long months at the National Rehabilitation Hospital in Dún Laoghaire followed, where McGill began the process of relearning how to walk.

His personality was not affected, he jokes. "I'm still an ass and it's not the brain injury's fault—much to people's dismay."

McGill is still working hard on his physio. "I'm a bit like drunk Bambi at 4am. The chair is obviously with me for the foreseeable," he says.

Last October, he made a return to the social scene he had enjoyed so much in his previous life.

"It was an adjustment, I didn't know how that was going to look or what it was going to be like being in a wheelchair."

He quickly came to realise that the places he used to frequent were no longer suitable for him as a wheelchair user. "It was eye-opening," he says, still dismayed at the fact that often, even venues claiming to be "accessible" don't have wheelchair accessible toilets.

"It's mind boggling. They only need to be able to get you in the door. I have a very compact wheelchair, but in a lot of places, you still wouldn't be able to go to the bathroom by yourself; you would need someone to hold a door at some point, and often you will find wheelchair toilets being used as a storage area."

Another bone of contention is the interior design of some restaurants and bars. "Some places will have done everything right [on paper] but the choices that have been made, like bench seating, means I can't sit there. Accessibility is always an afterthought."

He recognises that many of the buildings that house restaurants are restricted due to the age or style of the building. If they are protected and listed, for example, it's virtually impossible to add features such as lifts or exterior ramps.

But happily, there are many places that do put accessibility at the forefront of their design plans. For a night on the town that can be enjoyed equally, these places are leading the way.

The marvellous wonders hidden in Ireland's bogs

Game Changers Catherine Cleary

A bog walk a decade ago unlocked the door to another realm for photographer Tina Claffey. Botanist and geologist John Feehan led the walk in her local bog in Killaun, Co Offaly in 2012 and gave everyone a small hand lens. Through this, Claffey got her first glimpse of the intricate beauty under our feet. The world of stuff too small to be seen with the naked eye was transformed, and she had a kind of Alice-like tumble into wonder. "It was a walk that changed the course of my life," she writes.

Claffey bought a macro lens for her camera to capture what she had seen. Her work often involves lying fully flat on the surface of bogs to allow us to see more deeply. And in her newly-published Portal: Otherworldly Wonders of Ireland's Bogs, Wetlands and Eskers, she writes beautifully about how the bog and its inhabitants set the rhythm for the work. She follows the lead of the land and thanks the creatures for letting her take their portraits. The notes to the eerily exquisite photographs capture that personal relationship to the bog as well as plenty of identifying information from a team of experts. It is, she explains, "a gathering of observations, for I am a mere observer".

Divided into seasons, the book opens with the bog builder that is sphagnum moss, the plant that is now believed to provide the compound that preserves bog bodies for millenniums. Sphagnum can hold 20 times its weight in water, and Claffey's photograph shows its deep vibrant colours like a coral reef made of jelly flowers.

Along with spending quality armchair time with Portal, I've been listening to Annie Proulx's Fen Bog and Swamp. The book, which grew from an essay, is an



epic look at wetlands across the globe. We have demonised bogs until recently, mapped them as unproductive places needing to be drained or exploited, milled by industrial machinery into polluting fuel or a moisture-holding growing medium for cultivated plants. The novelist says studies that have counted the microorganisms which live in sphagnum moss show that every square metre of the moss can contain an estimated one billion of them.

Portal has sphagnum moss and so much more. There's a marsh fritillary's wing that becomes a Bayeaux tapestry of overlapping scales. In the winter pages, **Turkey-tail fungus in Abbeyleix Bog.** Photograph: Tina Claffey

the bare flower head remnants of wild angelica which look like "tiny fireworks, each one frosted with ice crystals". The book is a gem, a profound way of seeing and feeding our souls with the richness of the fragments we have left, habitats we have an urgent duty to protect and restore.

Portal is on permanent exhibition in the visitor's centre at Lullymore Heritage and Discovery Park in Kildare. The book is available to order here

Wildly expensive, utterly magical

Excitement levels are off **Conor Pope** the charts as the Popes go to the North Pole. But is a trip to Lapland worth the cost?

Travelling through airports and

boarding flights can be a stressfully miserable experience even at the best of times, and a flight that leaves many hours before dawn in the dead of winter as a cold rain falls hard on runways and taxi ranks is most definitely not the best of times.

Add close to 100 very sleepy children including one of your own - into the mix with a sprinkle of last-minute PCR tests (it's December 2021), Covid certs and a complete absence of clues as to what is actually happening and where you are actually going and you might expect to have a ready-made

disaster on your hands.

But not today. There isn't even a hint of grumpiness among the couple of hundred people who line up alongside three Popes to check in their baggage on a flight bound for the North Pole of all places.

A pair of Santa's little helpers bleary-eyed and, truth be told, possibly slightly hungover behind their festive face masks - greet the departing passengers with cheery waves, festive songs, Santa hats and selection boxes. It is hard not to smile. Impossible really.

After baggage is checked in by upbeat Aer Lingus staff, we move on to the security gates. But before we get there we $see\,a\,giant\,elephant\,in\,the\,departures$ hall, one we must address before going any further.

The elephant's name is Cost. And it is a big one. A Sunway trip to see Santa Claus in his home place before he sets off on his round-the-world Christmas Eve adventures is not cheap. It is, in fact, wildly

The so-called Sleighbell Spectacular, which covers two nights in an Arctic Circle chalet plus all the thermal clothes and boots and gloves you need, as well as sleigh rides on huskies and reindeers,

snowball safaris, meetings with elves, all your food, night-time tobogganing and the chance to get a glimpse of the northern lights as well as the most magical meeting the man himself, will cost two adults and two children €5,436.

The cost of a three-night trip tops €6,000. And those prices don't even include a single elf hat, Christmas decoration or outsize reindeer bought in one of the gift shops to be found smack in the middle of the Arctic Circle.

But here's the thing. Not once did I hear any of the parents who were on the tripwhich took place before the worst of the cost-of-living crisis kicked in, mind youcomplain about the money they had spent. Nor did anyone suggest they had got bad value for money, or that they would do it any differently – and believe me when I say the money spent was a topic I brought up more than once on the Lapland buses that ferried us to and from festive activities.

And – in so far as it is possible to tell such things – the aircraft was not exclusively populated by well-heeled folk with money to burn. There were teachers and bank officials and IT workers and me, the freeloading journalist - the trip was



covered for three Popes by Sunway, for the avoidance of all doubt. There is no question over the enduring popularity of the Lapland trips; in fact, some of the two-night excursions are already booked out for Christmas 2022, suggesting there are many people who are happy to pay whatever it takes to intensify the magic of Christmas, even in hard times such as these.

And it is a magical experience.

Now, having addressed the elephant in the departure hall we can board the aircraft. It is absolutely mental. Giddily excited passengers – not only children – wildly applaud the crew announcement and the safety instructions. There are more cheers when the destination is mentioned. And when Santa gets a shout-out, it feels like the roof of the aircraft could lift off.

Once all the usually flighty stuff is complete, the elves from the check-in gates take over the aircraft's public-address system and over the next three hours they invite us to the front of the aircraft to tell jokes. Then they hand out fancy paper so we can write our letters to Santa. There is face painting and there

are balloon animals.

As we fly to the frozen north, I can't help feeling that the journey will ruin the experience of flying for all the children on board, who will be forever left wondering why the crews on the aircraft bound for the Costa del Sol aren't singing happily and face painting and telling jokes and helping them to colour things in. Or, you know, smiling. Oh well.

Between games, Christmas music plays over the aircraft's speakers. Bruce Springsteen's Santa Claus is Coming to Town has never sounded so tinny. As he belts out his tune the voices around us get louder. The littlest Pope – who is about to turn four – sleeps through it all.

When we land in Rovaniemi and a planeload of Irish children see proper snow – many of them for the first time – the excitement levels are off the charts. We disembark quickly and are funnelled into the arrivals hall and on to buses, which take us to a large warehouse to be kitted out for snow times. It works like an assembly line. You walk through one door, get your snow suit and then your boots and hats and gloves and scarves and then out another door and back on the bus. It couldn't be more efficient. With so much to pack in to the next 48 hours, there is no time to waste dressing.


First up is the tobogganing. It is barely 3pm and already pitch dark, which only adds to the drama of the moment. I take the littlest Pope to the top of a snow mountain with the idea - at least my idea - being that we will go down the hill together, me on the toboggan and her on my lap. It is not her idea and at the top of the mountain she declares that she wants to go down on her own. We have one toboggan and before I can explain the logistical difficulties of her plan she is gone, travelling at terrifying speed down the slope. Left with no choice, I run and then slide and the tumble down the mountain on me arse — there is no more polite way to say it than that.

"Again, again," she shrieks. So we do it again. And again. At least I have a toboggan the second time round.

From the little hill – calling it a mountain may be an exaggeration – we get a go on a snowmobile. Older children travel in pairs but with a soon-to-be-four-year-old in tow we get a larger snowmobile driven by someone who knows what they are doing. It is cool. Actually, it is absolutely freezing but the clothes work wonders and protect us from temperatures which have plummeted to minus 15 degrees.

Once the ride is done, there is hot fruit juice, gingerbread cookies and marshmallows by roaring fires, and snowball fights, after which we are bussed to our hotel for the first time.

The hotel is lovely in a hygge kind of way, all dark woods and cosy throws and log fires. Check-in is as efficient as

the dressing-room in the snow, and minutes after walking through the welcoming doors, 200 tired but happy Irish people are heading to their rooms.

I'm delighted by the sauna in our room and turn it on, and immediately forget that I've done so. It's the Finnish equivalent of leaving the immersion on. We head to the hotel restaurant for dinner, an all-you-can-eat buffet. The food is decent and the buzz in the restaurant is lovely.

We sneak up to the hotel roof to look for the northern lights, and marvel as snow falls white on the mountain, not a footprint to be seen. Frozen we head back inside without a glimpse of the aurora borealis. It's too cloudy.

The big chill of the roof quickly becomes a distant memory. Having left the sauna/immersion on in the room it is now more Balearic than Baltic. Eventually a combination of the hotel room door open and frantic fanning on my part cools the room down to a temperature a human can sleep in.

The following morning we wake to the glorious sight of snow hanging heavy on the forest of pine trees outside our window. We wear the loosest-fitting tracksuit bottoms and T-shirts we have packed – athleisure is the watchword when it comes to packing for this type of adventure – and I look at all the other clothes I have stupidly brought north.

Breakfast is rushed as there is a hard

deadline of 8.30am for departure, and there has been a dire warning from an elf that the last people on the bus will have to sing a Christmas song. We make it to the bus with boots half tied at 8.36am. I clear my throat and get ready to sing Fairytale of New York but then another family arrives at the bus, similarly bedraggled.

We drive for 20 minutes – almost everything on the trip is 20 minutes away by bus – to meet the elves of the secret forest. They play games and tell us stories in smoky tents and we eat gingerbread.

A fierce-looking man dressed like Kristoff tells us about traditions in the North Pole, and then marks our heads with ash from the fire's embers for reasons I don't understand.

We then get to play in the snow, with sleds and toboggans on hand as elves sing happy songs. A giant bear approaches and we all take selfies.

And then something really special happens, something I am reluctant to go into any great detail about because one of the reasons it is so special is that it comes as such a surprise to both adults and children. So, all I will say is that it involves meeting Santa, a moment so lovely that it will restore the faith of anyone wavering in their belief in the magic of Christmas. It's a long way from Santa visits in Moons in Galway in the

1970s.

The littlest Pope is nervous and excited – nervocited, really. In truth, she is perhaps a bit young to really appreciate the moment – the golden age for such an adventure is probably between six and 10.

Lunch is potato wedges and pretty grim chicken nuggets for the kids, and a creamy, salty mess of a lasagne for the adults. It is hot though. Ever attuned to the price of everything, my ears prick up when I hear a row brewing at a nearby table. A woman had ordered three very small bottles of Coke and refused to pay the $\[\le \]$ 15 asked of her. To be fair to her, $\[\le \]$ 5 for a small glass bottle of Coke does seem extreme even by Finnish standards.

After lunch there we meet real-life reindeers who take us on a trip around a frozen lake. Our one is called Lika. We then have a 20-minute drive to the husky track, where we are treated to a long and excruciatingly detailed talk about huskies delivered by a well-meaning owner, after which we have a short but exhilarating spin with a pack of enthusiastic dogs around a track.

That night there is a "gala dinner" in a giant, Christmas-themed emporium. Incredibly skilled acrobats put on quite the show, after which food comes. It is underwhelming. There is soup – a tiny portion minus bread – followed by a Christmas ham for the adults, a couple

of small potato wedges and a smear of what was probably a carrot and parsnip mash. Think Michelin-sized portions in a canteen setting. The kids' bolognese is more substantial. After dinner we have to buy a bag of crisps, seldom a great sign.

The after-dinner activities are fun; there is a Santa train and a quick meet and greet with the man himself, and then back to the hotel.

On the third day we rise again and are bussed to the Santa Village, where there are shops, a post office, a line marking the start of the Arctic Circle that you can jump over, some more winter activities and lots of hot chocolate stalls. We are left to our own devices for a bit and then bussed back to the airport, stopping en route to leave back our thermals.

As they board the aircraft, all the adults look as shattered as if they had spend a week in Ibiza. The aircraft – much quieter on the way home than on the way here but equally happy – chases the darkness of the Arctic Circle to the twilight of Dublin as we close our eyes and will the events of the days just past to attach themselves to that part of the brain where long-term memories are stored. It's not a holiday you will never want to forget.

How to travel sustainably

Re-consider how you get to where you are going

The most sustainable way to travel is to go short distances either on foot or on a bike, but that advice is entirely unhelpful if you fancy a holiday far from home or a new experience overseas. Flying produces around 13 per cent of all greenhouse gases generated by EU transport, and the cumulative impact of cars is worse again. So, where possible, consider trains - they are the most eco-friendly mechanical mode of transport - and fun too if you approach them in the right spirit. If you must drive at home or rent overseas, do it less and in the most eco-friendly vehicle you can find and afford. Use public transport in your destination and if you

must fly, consider carbon offsets to fund projects that sequester carbon dioxide or develop environmentally friendly projects, but do your research as not all carbon offsetting schemes are equal.

Fewer and longer is better

Planes are at their most polluting when taking off and landing, which means short-haul flights and journeys with connecting flights are worse for the environment per passenger mile than long-haul journeys, so when travelling go as direct as possible. And a three-week holiday in one destination is better than three one-week holidays in different destinations.

Travel out of season

By avoiding the masses in tourist hotspots at the height of season you will be putting less pressure on your destination's environment while contributing to the local economy when it needs it more.

Book differently

We're all creatures of habit and use well-worn accommodation websites and booking platforms, but there are alternate avenues to explore. There is bookdif-

ferent.com for example, which has the tagline "feel good, stay green". It works out the carbon footprint of your accommodation based on how long you're staying, and points to eco-friendly options. The Global Sustainable Tourism

Council has a certification programme for hotels and tour operators, with participating members displaying its logo on their sites. And no matter how you book, look for accommodation that invests money first and foremost into local economies.


Actively seek out the best activities. We don't mean the most popular activities necessarily, but the ones which actively benefit the local community. Do your best to find local guides, family-run shops and restaurants and activities that benefit local people more than they benefit large multinational corporations. Locally sourced bike and walking tours are great options – withlocals.com is as good a place as any to start. And make sure to tip well. A fiver might not make a huge difference to you but it could feed another family for a day – or even longer depending on where you are.

At the risk of stating the obvious, leave no trace

That doesn't just apply when you are wild camping in the middle of nowhere. It applies everywhere, from the busiest street in Rome to the quietest ledge on Mount Kilimanjaro.

I am scared of yoga. Could a retreat change my mind?

I step on the teacher's foot as she helps me with the downward dog, but she's gracious enough never to speak of it again

I'm not the most obvious candidate to review a yoga retreat. For one thing, I am scared of yoga. The idea of lying in a room full of strangers, trying to contort my unyielding form into positions I suspect were not designed for bodies over the age of three, fills me with stress. In truth, I have only tried it once, during a pregnancy. I bailed out directly after real birth stories section – somewhere around the words "third degree tear" – and decided I am just not one of those people.

But after a bruising couple of years culminating in an emotionally taxing summer, an invitation to review a two-day Harvest Yoga Retreat at Ballymaloe in Co Cork arrived. Maybe it was the timing, or the word "Ballymaloe", a place associated with wholesome food, country air and a legendary dessert trolley. Whatever it was, a couple of weeks later,

here I am: sitting cross-legged on a yoga mat in the Ballymaloe Grainstore, surrounded by strangers and humming "om" without a trace of self-consciousness.

Most of our all-female group – not always the case, but it was on this retreat – are experienced at yoga. A couple of us (well, me) would struggle at Twister. But there is no pressure to try to keep up, as our warm, preternaturally kind yoga teacher Dearbhla Glynn constantly stresses that we should take it at our own pace. At some point during that first evening in the Grainstore, as I follow her invitation to stretch and open and twist my joints, I realise that I'm no longer silently compiling to do lists or scrolling through the endless list of worries about my children. It feels like a small miracle.

There's something about the intensive nature of a retreat that makes it difficult not to surrender. "It sounds like a lot of yoga," I think, when I read the programme that has been left in my beautiful, blessedly quiet room under the eaves. There's yoga before breakfast, preceded by a sea swim at 6am for the brave (I draw the line at surrendering to this). A mindful walk follows midmorning, which proves a struggle for a talker and pathologically nosy person surrounded by potential new friends, but I power through. There is yoga involving breath

work and relaxation before lunch. Afternoons are for rest or a trip to the cookery school with Bree Allen, who is a font of passion and knowledge about the history of Ballymaloe. There is yin and restorative yoga before dinner – all meals during my stay are around a big table in the main house – and yoga nidra before bed.

It is a lot of yoga, but by day two, I'm grateful for the complete immersion. Several poses are challenging, and my body is still uncooperative, but I wasn't expecting to unlock "future yoga instructor" in two days. I step on Glynn's foot as she tries to help me with the downward dog, and she's gracious enough never to speak of it again. But it's what happens in my mind that feels most profound. As I lie there, I feel myself cycling through emotions, sometimes sad, sometimes close to elated.

Every session ends with a 10-minute interval called savasana – or less lyrically, "corpse pose" – during which you lie on your back, palms turned upwards. I discover my gift: lying there, doing nothing. "Your only job now is to relax," Glynn says soothingly, as she glides around the room and makes sure we are adequately supplied with bolsters and blankets – everything you need on the retreat apart from your own clothes is provided. Afterwards, I feel transformed

and oddly lighter. Both nights I sink into a luxurious, undisturbed sleep.

The bits in between are almost entirely dedicated to food. There is heaps of it, and it is as delicious and nourishing as you'd expect, as is the chance to chat to the other retreat-goers. On Sunday we experience the famous carvery, created during Myrtle Allen's time, so that she could enjoy at least one meal with her family. The dessert trolley does not disappoint. Breakfast comes from both a buffet and a menu – the poached eggs with tomato and red pepper fondue are exceptional – and lunch is light and wholesome, focused on soups, salads and risottos.

It turns out I am the perfect candidate for a yoga retreat, and Ballymaloe is the ideal venue – not as sunny as Marbella or Ibiza, but close enough for a quick getaway. There's something special about the place. You can see why people come to do a cookery course and never leave. I feel a bit like that about yoga. The first thing I do when I get home is go online and book myself in for a block of eight of Glynn's online classes. I am one of those people now.




If anything is worth shelling out the euros for when it comes to clothing for the winter season, along with a good coat it must be boots. They should be comfortable, stylish, watertight, work with what's in the wardrobe, and be versatile day or night, with flared or skintight jeans, long or short dresses or skirts, with three-quarter, knee or floor-length coats.

The choice of styles this winter is broad but largely clumpy – high heels, flats, knee highs, Chelsea, buckled, biker, wedge, ankle, sock, combat or cowboy, leopard or snakeskin, kitten or killer. Lug soles with thick indented bases are trendy, the new counterparts to the tractor tyres so popular last year. Simone Rocha's leather tracker pumps set new standards in grounded femininity with lavish pearl embellishment and broderie anglaise detail, while her costly knee highs in polished black leather, designed for mini dresses, have chunky platforms and lace-ups.

At the other end of the spectrum, Carl Scarpa's Emma flat-heeled knee-high is such a successful best seller that a recent customer to its Grafton Street shop bought a pair in all colours. In Russell & Bromley's new Grafton Street shop, the biggest fashion-led items are platform and cowboy boots.

Beauty's most influential woman on Ireland and the power of honesty

On Beauty Laura Kennedy



At 52, Caroline Hirons' career is at its zenith in an industry usually obsessed with youth

Within the beauty industry, there is one name that holds more power than any other. The person whose good opinion guarantees a sell-out product, and in whose advice beauty consumers trust. Before catching up with expert aesthetician and author Caroline Hirons – the most influential woman in skincare – on her recent visit to the newly expanded Beauty Hub at Arnotts in Dublin, I decided to check in on her skincare blog. The one with more than 120 million page views

There, I found a recent review of Cosmoss, the skincare line launched last month by supermodel Kate Moss. "Who is it for?" Hirons writes, before answering her own question. "People who worship at the altar of Kate Moss, have no problems with their skin, and have money."

According to Statista, global revenue in the skincare sector will amount to over \$145 billion (€147 billion) in 2022 and is due to continue growing by more than 6 per cent annually. For those with industry power, there is serious money in beauty. This creates incentive to present a politically expedient public persona and carefully manage brand relationships behind closed doors. The extent of Hirons' willingness to subvert that is what separates her from every other voice in beauty.

Despite a 25-year career, it is now, at 52, that she is at her zenith in an industry traditionally obsessed with youth.

"It pisses me off when brands lie to the consumer. If [they] make claims that are too big, if they put it in language that's purposely disguising... or trying to embolden what they do," she says. For example, "brands saying they're sustainable because they ship their product instead of flying it – no one flies it unless they're in trouble and it's late. Everything – everything – goes on a boat, a

train. It's too expensive to fly."

The review of the Kate Moss line was typical of Hirons's candour. Its launch was uncritically presented in much media coverage – Moss is a superstar, after all.

"It would be easy for me, instead of reviewing it properly," suggests Hirons, "to say 'Oh, she's a supermodel. She shouldn't make skincare.' But that doesn't help the consumer. If they're reading how brilliant a product is but the

person writing about it hasn't had time to fully trial it because it hasn't been out that long, or making claims that an ingredient is 'shown to reverse the signs of ageing by 20 years in four weeks'...I'm like, 'ah, I call bulls**t'."

Hirons knows honesty is integral to her reputation. "If you give context to what you're saying and you're coming from a place of authority, you're qualified or you've got a lot of experience, or you've been in the industry a long time, then you're trusted," she says.

Through her YouTube videos, Instagram content, best-selling book, Skincare: The New Edit, and recently launched app, Skin Rocks, which provides skincare education and allows people to build a bespoke skincare routine, Hirons has leveraged that consumer trust into a position of unrivalled power

"I'm never actively trying to say to people 'do not buy this or that brand'. But, for example, when I reviewed the Kim Kardashian skincare range for the Skin Rocks app and the suggestion was 'you need this', I said "Well, you need this if you can buy it without checking your bank account and you love Kim Kardashian, but it's a lifestyle purchase, not a skincare purchase. Don't be fooled."

Hirons's great-grandparents emigrated from Limerick to Liverpool, and her connection to Ireland remains strong. While successful Irish beauty brands like Skingredients and Sculpted by Aimee have been garnering recognition in the UK over the past few years, Hirons was ahead of the pack in championing Irish beauty.

She recognised our voracious appetite for beauty, keen interest and spending power early on. "I see Ireland as a player on the global stage... there is a proper obsession with beauty here and people take it seriously, which is lovely because there are places where that still isn't the case," she says, despite the huge employment and revenue generated by this female-dominated industry.

With her frankness, penchant for swearing and refusal to shy away from discussing politics, Hirons is no stranger to online abuse, but she also has a reputation for robustness. I ask how she manages it. "

Online trolls are like a naughty two-year-old having a tantrum at the supermarket," she tells me merrily, as she's rushing off to her next appointment. "If you step over them and carry on with your shopping, they eventually get up and just go about their day."

'I like a woman but don't know whether to follow my head, or my gut'



Dear Roe,

I'm a single male in my mid-30s and over the years "gut feelings" have played a key role in my relationships and dating - each time leading me to end things (without regret). I am as certain as can be that these feelings haven't been because of any fear of intimacy, but because of the opposite: they stem from a healthy desire to have a deeply nourishing connection with someone on a similar wavelength as me. However, I have just encountered a person (a friend I've recently made) who "I", my conscious/thinking self, would like to ask out on a date. But the more I demonstrate interest, the more my gut has been giving me the same feelings that has led me to end previous relationships. I know it's because my gut feels the much sought after "deep connection" won't be possible with this person, but in my mind I'm thinking, she's got some lovely qualities and I won't fully know unless we both have the opportunity to explore the deeper parts of ourselves through dating and perhaps beyond. I've been left exhausted by the internal conflict and I'd really appreciate your view on whether this is a situation where I should or should not trust my

For someone so focused on feelings, you're wildly overthinking this. Ask her out.

A date is not marriage, nor a lifelong commitment. A date – in this case, a first date – is spending an hour or two together see how you feel around each other. That's it. Of course you will get to know a bit about the person, and if you're looking for a particular relationship structure or if you want to ascertain whether a person shares your values, you can ask about these subjects directly. But a lot of going on a first date is simply gauging whether someone makes you feel comfortable and engaged, and whether you want to go on another date.


You are currently viewing dating as very end-goal specific – and sometimes that can be understandable. Maybe you

want to get married in the next few years or have no interest in even causally dating someone that you don't see a long-term future with. In that case, remain friends with this person, enjoy getting to know them in a platonic way, and keep your romantic attention for someone who feels more closely aligned with what you want long-term.

However (you knew there was going to be a "however", right?), for someone who values their "gut feelings" so much, there's an interesting contradiction at play here. You trust your gut instincts so deeply that you have ended relationships because of them - but you also do have an instinct to ask this woman out. I wonder how you're differentiating between "gut instinct" and your "thinking" self, and if you are underestimating where they overlap - or if actually, maybe you have them reversed? I ask because you have met this woman and like her enough to want to spend time with her, yet you are intellectualising your way out of that feeling by analysing her, holding her up to the (apparently yet-fulfilled) idea you have in your head of a "deep connection", and convincing yourself - despite an "internal conflict" - not to ask her out. That doesn't sound like you are following a gut instinct, that sounds like you are intellectualising, over-analysing and ignoring your embodied and emotional desire to ask her out on the basis of an idealised hypothetical. Are you actually listening to your gut? Or are talking yourself out of opportunities to connect with people?

This idea of a gut feeling is important and often deeply misunderstood. Studies have shown repeatedly that our "gut" is very useful when it comes to things like safety and comfort, as our body can pick up even tiny signals about a situation or a person that feel unsafe. However, our gut can also be misled. For example, people with an experience of trauma or hyper-vigilance may repeatedly feel that safe situations are dangerous, because their "gut" is over-primed to look for danger. Similarly, people often talk about things like "gut instincts", "spark", and "chemistry" when they meet someone new or start dating, but often, people $\,$ who talk of "chemistry" aren't actually experiencing excitement but anxiety, insecurity and even stress, which can be triggered by people who are inconsistent, hard to read, or don't make us feel secure, keeping us in a heightened state.

This heightened state of early dating can be intoxicating, and some people can become hyper-focused on this early "honeymoon period" when the excite-



ment and uncertainty keeps every communication with the other person feeling visceral and intense. They can then lose interest when the relationship settles into something more long-term, serious and stable, believing that the feeling of security is the loss of "sparks". But as anyone in a happy long-term relationship will tell you, what comes after the honeymoon period isn't a loss of connection or intimacy, but another, deeper layer of it.

So I'm curious about your gut feelings. Are they embodied? Is it a state of comfort, or a heightened state of "sparks"? Which do you value, which do you turn from, and why? It is interesting to me that you have ended all of your relationships, and I'm curious about how long your relationships usually last and what precipitates the break-ups - is it a loss of the "spark" that initially attracted you? Is it when the relationship begins to feel more serious, stable and less exciting? And importantly, how do you balance your "gut" instincts with the effort, work and commitment required in long-term relationships? Relying on your gut could mean relying on what simply feels easy and exciting – but how often have you $stayed\ in\ a\ relationship\ long\ enough\ to$ reach another layer of intimacy, or to work at maintaining intimacy when life becomes routine? How often have you tried forms of intimacy that fall outside of the version you have in your head?

There is something rigid and slightly arrogant about your assumption that you know, even before going on a single date with someone, that it won't be possible to deeply connect with them. Ironically, you

are shutting down the hopes of a connection before it can even begin. What would it mean to expand your ideas of what intimacy could look like? For example, if you value a lot of emotional intimacy quickly, how are you underestimating the deep connection that comes with respecting boundaries and building up trust over time? If you value intellectual sparring, how could you learn to meet someone on a more embodied or emotional level? And for someone who values having a clear idea of what you want and not even going on one date with someone who might not match up, what could you learn by remaining curious, by being vulnerable, by trying to forge a connection that you aren't trying to analyse and evaluate from the jump? What could you learn by paying attention to the ways another person views deep connection, and how they choose to build it?

This woman may not turn out to be the love of your life, and that's fine. But trying something new, choosing not to write someone off, and listening to your desire to go on a date with her will be valuable. Don't lead her on, take things slowly, and try to stay in the moment. See what you can learn. Pay attention to the times where you would usually disengage, and try to stay present. See what different forms of connection you can forge.

If nothing else, going on a date will end your "internal conflict", which seems like a pretty good deal. Good luck. •

Restaurant Review Corinna Hardgrave



Luxurious dining from an Irishman in London

I could eat Patrick Powell's crab toast for starter, main course and dessert

Booking lunch rather than dinner has long been my way of eating affordably in London's finest restaurants. Le Gavroche and the Ledbury were the legendary bargains, (sadly those lunch menus are no more); and Galvin at Windows, where we treated our two daughters to their first Michelin-star meal before they'd even reached double digits. (Not quite the magnanimous act you may think; at the time, there was a £10 children's menu on Sundays.)

Checking out the London "Murphia" (Irish mafia) has always been of interest too – Richard Corrigan, Robin Gill and Anna Haugh – but a name that is less familiar but very highly regarded is Patrick Powell, the Mayo native who worked as head chef at Chiltern Firehouse alongside Nuno Mendes, the much-lauded Portuguese executive chef. Back in the day, it was an A-lister restaurant with carefully guarded gates, not the sort of place that does an affordable lunch for civilians; so I never had the opportunity to taste Powell's cooking.

Which is why, on my first trip back to London since the whole hoo-ha, I've headed out to Stratford for lunch where Powell is the main man in what is being mooted as east London's next hot spot. It's a bit of a trek, I have to say. And the area is most certainly emerging. The Stratford Hotel is set across the first seven floors of the 42-floor Manhattan Loft Gardens, which looms against a background of what looks like Stalin-era brutalist architecture.

But the Allegra restaurant is all international luxury; João Gilberto lounge music, muted tones, and seating areas with enough distance for discreet conversation; although for some unfathomable reason, the banquettes are a shade too high to allow for comfortable leg crossing. If you've got the Goldilocks gene, it might



be wise to go for the chair.

Our very first bite, choux buns (£3.50 each) carpeted in bright green pistachio shrapnel, is quite spectacular. A delicious crunch yields to a rich yet light chicken liver parfait with the slightest hint of sweetness, piqued with a singular dot of black garlic and a sliver of candied clementine.

The same meticulous care and magical way with flavours is put into the three mini Waldorf tarts (£7). Impossibly fragile cases cosset precisely cut cubes of pressed Colston Bassett apple that has the most delicious kick of acidity, dusted with an ethereal cloud of blue cheese. The Domaine Wachau Gruner Veltliner (£44), from a list that might make you feel a bit jittery, pairs nicely.

Although it is not spelled out, all of the produce used here is top drawer. For the beef tartare (£15), it is dairy cow, hand chopped, and tiled with red and yellow smoked, pickled carrots, and nasturtium leaves. Crab on toast with shellfish sauce (£16) sounds reasonably straightforward, but this is a dish that I would return to eat for starters, main course and dessert. The quality of the handpicked Devon crab is outstanding-well-defined individual pieces of sweetness on brioche toast-and the shellfish sauce is exquisite, dotted with peridot-coloured spheres of oil. There are notes of chervil and just a whisper of something floral, which I discover on checking the menu later, is elderflower.

Our shared main course – we've opted for plaice (£42) from seven very good roast options – has a much more rustic approach than the previous dishes. A Skeppshult cast iron pan is brought to the table, with a large tranche of plaice on the bone. It is surrounded by mussels and beads of fregola and trout roe in a buttery

sauce, punched up with pickled fennel. There is so much eating in the dish that we could have skipped our side order of roast carrots with harissa and crispy flaked almonds (£7).

There is, of course, room for dessert, and we finish with a very good mille feuille (£11), three golden pieces of compressed buttery pastry, filled with squiggles of custard cream and served with a quenelle of Epping honey ice-cream. It's central casting Michelin – precise and delicious.

Stratford is unlikely to be top of my destination list in London, and the Westfield Mall beside it ticks each concentric circle of hell. But there's a lot of talk among the Murphia about Powell, how he's cooking his finest food yet, and this would definitely seem to be the case. Lunch is not cheap, but a new £38 set menu has just been introduced which would certainly be worth checking out.

Lunch for two with snacks, a bottle of wine and 12.5 per cent service charge was £168.63 (£193.59).

What's on offer?

Jianan Liu will be familiar to viewers of RTÉ's Takeaway Titans, as she scooped the top prize last month for her food truck, Janet's. She is best known for her dumplings, made using her grandmother's recipes, which she sells from her brightly painted stall in Eatyard. The menu is quite broad and also includes baos, rice bowls, and ramen, with a good selection of vegetarian and vegan options.

What did we order?

Mixed gyozo (10 dumplings), a pork bao, and a Sichuan crispy chicken rice bowl.

How was the service?

Unbelievably friendly, with an immediate

offer of tasters of the crispy Sichuan chicken and the pork belly. We were asked if we wanted to eat there or take away; with the option to eat in the Bernard Shaw, and have the food delivered there. A pint in the Bernard Shaw and our food delivered piping hot was just the thing for a Sunday afternoon, with the added bonus of a fabulous drag show.

Was the food nice?

It was incredibly tasty, particularly the gyoza. The fillings in silky, pleated wrappers ranged from chicken, spicy tofu, cheeseburger, and spinach with peanuts, to prawns with chives, which was the favourite. The soy-based dipping sauce had a nice kick of citrus.

The crispy Sichuan chicken rice bowl, laced with kewpie mayo and sriracha sauce, had crunch, sweetness and a touch of heat going on, all very moreish.

Pickled cabbage, crispy onions and peanuts added a nice crunch to the pork belly bao.

Autumn comfort food: Perfect pumpkin recipes

Make the most of half-price pumpkins this week - just don't use the one from your windowsill



I love late autumn. For me it's a sensory explosion filled with the smell of mulched leaves, misty fog and bonfires.

As a chef, I look forward to autumn as it is the season of comfort food and vibrant dishes with root vegetables, leafy greens and a hint of Christmas spices – without the full clove and cinnamon flavour.

Pumpkin is synonymous with autumn, as it is the most colourful

vegetable of the season and on display in most households, lit internally with a candle and some ghoulish carvings.

I love cooking with pumpkin and squash, and the best time is right now at the height of their season, just after Halloween when supermarkets and vegetable shops have them on offer for half the price, as they can't be sold for carving for another year.

For condiments such as miso and bonito vinegar, head to your local

Asian shop and you will find these umami rich ingredients which are great

cupboard staples to enrich flavour. I have iust recently come across tinned pumpkin purée, and it is incredibly useful in desserts.

These are my three favourite ways to eat pumpkin, and there are so many more.

Just make sure not to use the candle filled one from your windowsill.

Baked Hokkaido pumpkin, brown butter hazelnuts, bonito vinegar,

SERVES: 2 PREP TIME: 10MINS COOKING TIME: 30MINS

goats' cheese

INGREDIENTS

1 Hokkaido pumpkin 10ml vegetable oil 150q salted butter

1 garlic clove

70g hazelnuts

50ml bonito vinegar (you will find this in Asian stores but if you don't have it use a light white vinegar mixed with a few drops of soy sauce) 150g goats' cheese (I use St Tola)

1 bunch chives, finely chopped Sea salt and black pepper

METHOD

1. Cut the pumpkin straight down the centre lengthways. Scoop out the seeds and then run seeds under cold water to remove excess pumpkin from them. Dry them on a clean cloth.

2. In a pan, heat the vegetable oil and place the pumpkin halves skin side up in the pan. After three minutes, add the butter and the garlic clove (minced), and transfer to a preheated oven for 20 minutes at 180C. Once removed from the oven, take the pumpkin out of the pan.

3. Add the hazelnuts and pumpkin seeds into the pan (with the butter and garlic) and brown for two minutes on a medium heat. Deglaze the pan with bonito vinegar and then put the pumpkin back in the pan. Spoon the hazelnut butter over the pumpkin and transfer to a serving dish.

4. Add goats' cheese, chives, season and pour any remaining butter from pan over the top.





Vegan pumpkin risotto, crispy sage, pickled pumpkin, gremolata

SERVES: 6 **PREP TIME: 20MINS COOKING TIME: 40MINS**

INGREDIENTS:

2ltr vegetable stock 1kg pumpkin peeled, deseeded and diced (you can shave some into thin circles for the pickle, if you wish) 25ml olive oil 100g diced shallot 100g diced leek 5 cloves garlic, minced 500g arborio rice 100ml white wine 1 bunch sage 200g vegan butter 10g miso paste 1 lemon, zest of 1 small bunch parsley 30g walnuts, roasted 30ml white wine vinegar (chardonnay if you have a choice) 30g caster sugar Sea salt and black pepper 100g vegan cheese (optional)

METHOD

1. Roast 800g of pumpkin on a tray with two cloves of garlic. 10ml olive oil, salt and pepper for 45 minutes at 180C. Heat one litre of the vegetable stock and combine with the roasted pumpkin in a blender. Blitz until smooth. Set aside. 2. In a wide bottomed saucepan, add the remaining olive oil and gently sauté the shallot, leek and two cloves of garlic for 10 minutes. Add the rice and cook for one minute. Add the white wine and stir. Add the pumpkin purée, remaining vegetable stock, miso and 100g of the vegan butter. Cook on a low heat, stirring often, for 25 minutes (check the rice is cooked by tasting, it should be almost soft with a very light bite). 3. For the gemolata, add the remaining vegan butter to a pot and once hot, add the sage. Cook the sage leaves in

the vegan butter until crispy and remove the sage from the pan. Add 100g of the diced pumpkin, the walnuts and one garlic clove into the pan with the butter and cook for two minutes. Add the finely chopped parsley and the zest of one lemon.

4. Heat the sugar and vinegar in a pot and once simmering, add the remaining diced or thinly cut pumpkin. Take off the heat and allow the pumpkin to pickle in the residual heat.

5. To assemble, spoon the risotto into a bowl (adding extra stock if necessary beforehand), and garnish with the pickled pumpkin, the gremolata and the crispy sage. Shave the vegan cheese on top. Of course, you can use dairy butter and Parmesan or another hard cheese of your choice, if you don't want to make this a vegan dish.

Pumpkin pecan cream pie

SERVES: 6 PREP TIME: 30MINS COOKING TIME: 75MINS INGREDIENTS:

For the pastry: 155g plain flour (plus a little extra for dusting) 55g icing sugar 80g unsalted butter 1 large egg yolk For the pie filling: 10g cornflour (1 tbsp) 250g demerara sugar 3 large eggs 450g pumpkin puree (tinned) 280ml double cream, plus 150ml for whipping 1 tsp cinnamon 1/2 tsp ground ginger 1/2 tsp vanilla extract 200g pecans 50g caster sugar 1 orange, zest of

METHOD

1. For the pie crust: In a bowl, mix the room temperature butter and the icing sugar together with a wooden spoon. Once fully mixed, sieve in the flour and mix well. Add

the egg yolk and mix until a soft dough is formed. Move the dough on to a counter top and lightly knead to ensure all ingredients are distributed evenly. Cover the dough in cling film and leave in the refrigerator for at least 25 minutes.

2. Take the dough from the fridge and lightly dust a counter top with a little flour. Using a rolling pin, roll the pastry dough out round until 5mm in depth. Using the rolling pin, roll the pastry up and then unroll into a 10-inch/25mm non stick pie tin. Use your fingers to push the pastry into the tin, ensuring the tin is fully lined. 3. Place a layer of baking parchment over the pastry and fill the inside of the tin with baking beans (you can use any dried beans for this and reuse them). Place the pie crust into a preheated oven at 170C for 20 minutes. Remove the baking beans (be careful as they will be hot) and return

the pie crust to the oven and bake for a further ten minutes. Remove from the oven and allow to cool

4. For the pie filling: In a bowl, mix the cornflour, demerara sugar and eggs together. Add the pumpkin, cream, spices and vanilla and mix until smooth.

5. Place the pie filling into the pre-baked crust and smooth the top with a spatula. Bake in a preheated oven at 190C for 45 minutes (to check that it is cooked, place the blade of a knife in the centre and if it comes out clean, the filling is cooked). Cool on a wire rack. 6. In a pan, melt the caster sugar and when slightly brown, add the pecans. Coat the pecans in the caramelised sugar for 30 seconds. Allow to cool. Chop roughly with a knife. 7. Whip the remaining cream and spread on top of the cooled pie. Generously sprinkle the pecans on top and finish by grating the orange

Spend Less, Eat Well Lilly Higgins

An autumn root veg mash up

The perfect seasonal side for lamb, beef or chicken

Lately I've been buying my vegetables online from Green Earth Organics, a family run farm in Galway. I've been prioritising Irish grown in an attempt to support farmers and eat as seasonally as possible.

Mashed root vegetables is the perfect dish to make with all of those carrots, parsnips and turnip. It can be rustic and chunky, or a smoother purée. It's incredible when used to top a shepherds pie. Leftovers, not that there's usually any, make the ideal base for a soup. I usually make a huge batch using a big bunch of carrots, a few parsnips and that peppery turnip. Set half aside for another day, or freeze and label. It's so handy to have.

If you still have a few pumpkins lying around, then add some of the flesh to this mash. Butternut squash is great too. Add a pinch of nutmeg for pure autumn warmth.

This mash is great with roast chicken, or slow cooked beef in a rich gravy. I'm serving it with lamb here. The cooking juices can be used as a sauce that tastes so good with the root mash.

I love lamb steaks, and always resort to the same reliable marinade. A dash of sharp but sweet, sticky balsamic vinegar, lemon zest, crushed garlic and some fresh, bright rosemary. It's such a wonderful mix of flavours. You could also use a little red wine in place of the balsamic. The longer the lamb steaks are left to marinade the better they will taste. I usually pop them into the marinade as soon as I buy them. Sealed in a lunchbox in the fridge, dinner is never too far away.

Lilly's kitchen tips

1. Use your carrot and parsnip peels to make stock. You can pop them into a bag in the freezer and just keep adding to it.
2. Make stock in the slow cooker. Low and slow will extract the most flavour, and is more energy efficient.



Balsamic lamb steaks with root vegetable mash

SERVES: 4 PREP TIME: 15 mins COOKING TIME: 30 mins

INGREDIENTS:

4-8 lamb steaks
2 sprigs rosemary, finely chopped
2 cloves garlic, roughly crushed
1/2 tsp salt

2 tbsp balsamic vinegar Zest of 1/2 lemon 1 tbsp olive oil

6 medium carrots, peeled ½ turnip, peeled 2x parsnip, peeled 1tbsp butter

1 tbsp butter 1 tbsp honey or maple syrup 1 tsp wholegrain mustard Sea salt White pepper

METHOD:

1. Place the rosemary, crushed garlic, salt, balsamic, lemon zest and olive oil into a container. I usually use a lidded Tupperware. Add the lamb steaks, place the lid on tightly and shake to coat everything. Place in the fridge for a few hours, or leave on the countertop for 15 minutes before cooking.

2. Meanwhile, make the mash. Peel the carrots, turnip and parsnip and chop into equal bite-size pieces. Simmer them all in a pot with boiling water until tender for about 20 minutes. Drain and add the butter, honey or maple syrup and mustard. Season well with salt and pepper. Use a potato masher or stick blender to create a mash or purée. Taste for seasoning, then place the lid on to keep warm.

3. Heat a griddle or frying pan and cook the steaks over a high heat for 2 minutes on each side until just cooked through. Leave to rest for 2 minutes before serving with the mash and any juices from the pan.

Proof is in the pudding

These smoked puddings are great added to salads or a sausage roll filling

What is it? The Smokin' Butcher Beechwood Smoked Black & White Pudding (€4,100g x 2).

What's good about it? The black pudding is made with fresh pigs' blood and natural pork casing, with no artificial additives or preservatives. The white one has a good percentage of pork (72 per cent), plus pork liver (13 per cent) and pork rind (7 per cent). Both are smoked over beech wood chips and are made by Hugh Maguire Butcher in Ashbourne, Co Meath. The black pudding was supreme champion at the Great Taste Awards in London in 2017, competing against 12,500 food and drink products.

How do I use it? The puddings are already cooked so just need to be heated

by grilling or pan frying. You can take the pudding out of the casing and crumble it before frying. The tasty, crisp nuggets can be added to salads



(apples and blue cheese are great with it), or served with grilled scallops. Crumbled black pudding also makes a great addition to a sausage roll filling, or a coating for Scotch eggs. Food writer Niamh Shields makes it into a pasta sauce with tomatoes, a dish she calls spaghetti Corkese.

Where can I buy it? It is available online for nationwide delivery from hughmaguirebutchers.com, and is also stocked in lots of independent food stores including Fallon & Byrne and Nolans of Clontarf, both in Dublin; Sheridans in Co Meath; Ardkeen Quality Food Store in Waterford and J J O'Driscoll in Cork.

Anything else? Smokin' Butcher has a limited edition chocolate pudding, to celebrate National Black Pudding Day.

A rich red perfect for winter plates

Expect to pay about €50 for a bottle of good amarone from Italy's Veneto region

A visit to the venerable house of Masi in Valpolicella, which was celebrating its 250th anniversary, provided proof that quality amarone ages very well. We tasted 35 wines, some single vineyard, covering seven decades. The 1958 and the 1990 were just two of many highlights. Sandro Boscaini, the fifth generation of the family, has fought for decades to ensure that the name amarone is not

abused by inferior, inexpensive wines.

Our wine shops and supermarkets are full of wines labelled "appassimento". These wines are made using grapes that have been dried to increase sugar levels and therefore alcohol, as well as intensifying flavour. As the grapes dry they lose volume, so producers have an interest in keeping the drying period short.

The original appassimento is recioto della valpolicella, a sweet wine. Amarone is the dry version. It is made only in the Valpolicella zone of northwest Italy, using local grape varieties. Quality producers will dry their grapes on straw mats for an extended period, up to three months, losing 30-40 per cent of their weight, before gently pressing and then fermenting the juice. Cheaper wines, both in Valpolicella and elsewhere, may have only a few weeks' drying.

You can expect to pay about €50 for a bottle of good amarone. Ripasso is a halfway house, made by referementing a Valpolicella wine on used amarone skins. It has some of the richness of an amarone and the fruit of a Valpolicella.

Traditionally amarone is enjoyed at the end of a meal with some aged Parmesan, possibly some gorgonzola, and crackers. However, it goes perfectly with a wide range of cold-weather dishes, including roast red meats, game, rich pasta dishes and risotto, including risotto
