# We need more

the Russians are



EVGENY peers down the barrel of a machine gun and says "f\*\*k the Russians" before he fires at Moscow's troops as Kyiv gears up to repel the invader from Ukraine.

The 23-year-old rattles off round after round of 12.7mm thick armour-piercing bullets that explode when they hit their target.

The Kord gun's muzzle flashes and the sound is deafening as he blasts at the Kremlin's men on their frontline just 1km to the east.

It comes amid fierce fighting in the outskirts of Kupiansk, a city in the north eastern state of Kharkiv which borders the Russian region of Belgorod.

In villages dotted along the landscape, plumes of smoke rise into a blue sky after Moscow's shells hit homes where locals still live.

The civilian death toll rises almost daily as the some 5,000 remaining residents in Kupiansk who refuse to flee the war are brutally killed.

The bloody fighting this week played out as Kyiv's defiant troops gear up to drive out the invader in a much trumpeted counter-offensive.

But here in Kupiansk, Russia is making slow gains as Ukrainian fighters holding the line plead for the West to send more weapons — and faster.

We are standing in a room on the third floor in a concrete carcass of a building on rural land that is a stretch of Kyiv's zero frontline — just 50km from the border with Russia.

Evgeny, a member of the Freikorps

volunteer brigade, steps back from the Kord weapon he had blasted at Moscow's troops and the air stinks of gun powder.

There is little to see of any damage inflicted on the enemy to the untrained eye but hardy shooter Evgeny knows that out there is danger. "The sniper groups are sitting

"The sniper groups are sitting in the forest and these bullets I fired are cutting the trees and [the branches] falling on them."

## **Positions**

But the tough soldier doesn't fear the Kremlin's men firing back. "They don't want to reveal their positions."

And even if the Russians do blast out rounds, Evgeny shrugs it off. "I don't care — f\*\*k the Russians."

Evgeny nods at the Kord weapon propped up in between a wall of sandbags.

"A Russian trophy," he laughs. He said his brigade "borrowed" it in one of its past pushes on the enemy's frontline.

The Freikorps volunteer brigade is made up of some 100 men, its commander Marak says. They range in age from early 20s to early 40s and in the past were everything from law students to programmers.

He told how he believes the expected Ukrainian counter-offensive to kick out the Russian invaders is ready to roll.

It comes as the Freikorps unit

played a key role in driving enemy forces out of Kharkiv city last May.

## **Enemy**

But Vlad warns that this time around the bid to kick out the Kremlin's men will unlikely garner international headlines so quickly.

These days, the enemy is grounded in its positions and Ukraine will first

have to prod Moscow's frontline for weak points before any big battle.

"It will happen [the counter offensive], but not the way the West expects it," Vlad said.

Vlad is from a now Russian occupied area. He fears his mother there will be tortured to give information.

We later hop into an SUV, with Vlad at the wheel as he races along

a stretch of a dirt track road at a frightening speed.

We are a target for anti-tank rockets," Vlad says.

He eases off the revs as we drive into the heart of Kupiansk.

Further into town, we drive past derelict houses with caved in roofs, smashed walls and window frames that are blackened.

An air raid siren wails yet the streets are already deserted now in the evening. Some 5,000 people remain from a population of 26,000 before the war, soldiers say.

Further on, we pull up by a five storey apartment block and peer in at a crater about 10m wide.

Locals explained that Russia hit here with a The S-300 missile, in

January. It barely missed the flats, a few metres away.

Babushka Leida sits on a bench outside the building.

She explained that she and another elderly woman are the only two residents in the apartment block.

"Everybody left here. I am in my 80s — I can die here the same as anywhere else," she says

We are now back in the SUV and bounce along muddy potholes by a half demolished bridge. About 30m below, the muddy Oskil River flows.

A kilometre or so east, a plume of smoke rises in a village after another Russian shell strike.

Kupiansk was in the hands of the Russian invaders for months before Ukrainians troops liberated the area the war is to get its hands on western in September. The push drove Moscow's army east towards Belgorod.

# City

Now Moscow is driving back and aims to again seize the city, the Freikorps brigade says.

"It's very useful for them — they need to go through this river," Freikorps bridage boss Bogdan Voizekhovskiy said.

"Russia can't accept the idea of an independent Ukraine. They want it as part of Russia or to destroy it.

Bogdan is confident of a victory for Ukraine, but fighters in his Freikorp brigade admit that for now Russia is making gains here in Kupiansk.

"Let's say we could have had more success than we do now," says another Vlad (40).

He is at the coalface of the battle

front operating a howitzer — basically a canon gun on wheels.

We are standing in the porch outside the Freikorps unit's safehouse by fields where the sound of crickets chirping is interrupted by distant explosions.

Vlad sits down on a low wall next to it and says that key for his brigade and Ukraine's military in general to win weapons — and faster.

We need fighter jets, more ammo, tanks," Vlad says. ammo, shells,

"Because in Kupiansk they [Russians] are pushing hard.

the soldiers try to wind down in between battles. One soldier, Alex, says

that the men are used to the frightening sounds. The men have Elon

Musk's Starlink internet service for secure calls to family.

"My mother worries about me here but I talk to her a lot," Evgeny says.

Evgeny and Alex are sure that Ukraine will repel Russia and together they chant: "Slava Ukraini" — glory to Ukraine.

# MAN SEES DRONE

A DRONE rises into a cloudy sky with its tiny propellers whining on a mission to destroy a Russian army target.

Ukrainian soldier Tapk peers up at the black Mavic 3 Pro as it flies east towards Moscow's frontline, just over 500m away.

The goal is to zoom over a building where Tapk says the Russian army has parked tanks. There are also military vehicles used to transport troops and weapons along the frontline.

It comes amid fierce fighting here around the city of Kupiansk in Ukraine's north eastern state of Kharkiv.

Moscow aims to seize the area and link up with already occupied turf to the southeast in the Donbas region.

Ukraine is struggling to hold the line in Kupiansk, soldiers say, but Kyiv is gearing up for a counter-offensive.

The Star embedded with the Freikorps brigade in the area and watched how the unit caused havoc for the enemy.

It is just after 6am and we are standing in long grass outside a derelict building as explosions from distant shelling boom.

Both Kyiv and Moscow have also harnessed tech in this hybrid war and wage attacks with drones.

## **Enemies**

"Get inside, fast," Tapk shouts, looking up at a sky that hangs over dull green fields. There are Russian drones patrolling."
"Two or three – enemies," fellow drone

pilot David roars.

We scurry down stairs into a basement in the derelict house, pushing through a damp brown rug that serves as a door.

Tapk and fellow Freikorps drone unit pilot David sit in the gloom as a mobile power generator hums outside.

In the corner stands a bulky grey device, a blue light shining from a console.


It is Elon Musk's Starlink that allows the Ukrainian army to enjoy secure comms free from the enemy listening in.

Tapk and David hunch over consoles on their laps for the strike mission. Tapk focuses on a satellite map image on his screen of the target while David toggles two joysticks that operate the drone.

Third and final eapons complex

over the target - three one-storey long Msta B in a recent push on enemy lines. buildings in a disused farm. It is just 594m in the distance, in a stretch of no man's land that divides Ukraine and its invader.

David points at his screen.

This is the enemy transport base where the Russians store vehicles. Cars, tanks transport. We will destroy it."

A Motorola radio crackles and Tapk replies to the artillery team, calling out coordinates.

## Crack

The soldiers at the site wear headphone-like ear protection and step back. The gun barrel then bows and blasts out a 152mm calibre shell that gives off a sharp crack. Smoke bil-lows and debris from the spent shell scatters. David's screen shows a plume of smoke ris-

Tapk calls out fresh coordinates for a second strike that misses again.

"It is the last one now," David says, tapping

his finger on the screen.

The artillery gun fires again and David and Tapk hold their breath and stare at their screens. They let out a roar, pumping fists.

"We got it, we got it!"

Mission accomplished but no enemy killed as it appeared they cottoned on to the attack.

was listening in on their comms

and said they were senior officers," David says.

Outside, Tapk grabs the drone now hovering just over his head and sets it on a wooden stool as the propellers stop buzzing.

David smokes a cigarette and nods at the Mavic 3 device.

'Drones are the future of war," he says slowly. "They are the most practical and show very good results - attacking assault units and even

defence."

It is made in China and top end models can cost up to €3,000 in commercial retailers. But David fears they will become scarce in Ukraine as Beijing and Moscow have forged a "no-limits" partnership in trade.

"I think they will be harder for us to get as

Russia and China get closer.

We'll see."

AN Irish soldier in Ukraine who is on a Russian kill list with a \$50,000 bounty on his head said he is "guaranteed a slow and brutal death" if captured.

Rhys Byrne, 28, from Santry, Dublin, is attached to the International Freedom Fighters who operate on the front lines and in territory seized after Putin's illegal invasion last February.

He is one of more than 400 foreign fighters on the dossier of death drawn up by the Kremlin.

Rhys believes Moscow's spies compiled the names through their network of spooks in Ukraine.

Kyiv's own SBU spy chiefs found the catalogue of foreign targets through its network.

Rhys' name is among 14 Irish names, including one female under the heading Ireland.

He said: "It's for the capture of anyone on that list who is a foreign fighter. I think they [Russians] just got names and said, 'Right let's just scare the foreigners'.

"If I get captured by the Russians, I am guaranteed a slow and brutal death, because I'm covered in anti-Russian tattoos.

"If I get captured they consider us war criminals. We would be charged in a Russian court and then executed.

"They wouldn't get that far with me. They'll just f\*\*\*ing kill me.

"If they capture me, I don't know how that scenario would occur, because when I'm on the frontline I always keep a round [of bullets] for my pistol and rifle for me. "I also keep a grenade for myself as

I don't plan on getting captured.

"We have an unwritten rule within our units and that is if we saw one of us being captured, if we have a shot to take out our lad, we will."

The Irish Mirror secured the "hit list' in Ukraine from a Danish foreign fighter who was also on the dossier.

Rhys revealed the Ukrainian military contacted him last September to confirm he was a target for Moscow.

He added gardai also called to also warn him he was in the Kremlin's sights.

He said: "They [gardai] advised me on this and that but I spoke to one of them. I turned on my camera [and showed his assault weapon], I said, T've got my own hardware. I'm not worried about it'."

Rhys added the danger is if Moscow's forces corner him on the battlefield but he has no fears they can target him in Ukrainian-held territory. He said: Rhysnamed Hero faces on Kremlin kill brutal death if list of fighters ever captured

"If the death squads come for me, I'm in a military unit, [so] you've got to infiltrate it.

"If anyone comes in to take me out. he's not getting out, so you have to send someone suicidal and someone suicidal doesn't really think through plans. So I'm not

too worried about it at all, and when the start of the war. When I heard I'm in country [in Ukraine], I always have my weapon with me 24/7.

"I am 100% ready to die if necessary. I don't want to die and it's not because I'm not afraid to die. I'm afraid of what dying will do to the people left to mourn, who care about me, because they're the ones who suffer.

'Í have to get back [home] for their sake. If I didn't have any family members and people I know who care for me, I probably would have died already, because what would I have to live and fight for?"

Rhys, who served in the French Foreign Legion and the private sector, added images of women and children killed in Russian shelling

arms. He said: "I was there from

Russians were killing kids and just eradicating everything in front of them, I said, 'That's not right'.

"I have benefits and skill sets that can help. So basically I wanted to go over and stand up to the world's biggest bully."

He revealed: "There are parts [around the front] where you will get small arms fire and you will come into engagements with occupiers.

# **Russian top** brass terror over latest attack plan

RUSSIA'S senior generals are "horrified" at Vladimir Putin's demand for an urgent new military offensive in Ukraine, it was claimed last night.

They fear yet more "slaughter" as a new analysis suggests the Kremlin has now lost a staggering 175,000 troops in the war.

Political analyst Valery Solovey said Putin's demand for his war supremo General Valery Gerasimov to unleash 'an assault in several directions at once" has created deep divisions.

## **SLAUGHTER**

The former professor at Moscow's Institute of International Relations, a spy training school, said: "The Army General Staff is terrified. I am not exaggerating

"They are afraid to lose the remaining armed forces in the slaughter that they are being dragged into by Putin's order.'

Mr Solovey said they will still obey Putin even though the commanders have given up on their "goal of winning" the war.

The Kremlin still insists Putin's military adventure is going according to plan.
